President's Report

Much has transpired since the last newsletter. The four rooms on the east side of the second floor are basically completed as well as the bathroom. Now restoration work can continue on the three west rooms this fall. Much of the woodwork is near completion but the walls are very rough and will need extensive detailing. The ceilings also need plastered in these rooms. Please note while removing a plastic covered wooden shelf in room 6 a nearly perfect 1951 New Years edition of "The Arcanum Times" newspaper was found. In room 7 a 6 cent Ohio sales tax stamp was discovered on the floor.

Bud's Electric installed a new exit light in the north room on the first floor. The toilet and sink in the bathroom connecting to the north room need updated to meet state code. A new floor covering will be installed at that time.

Take a look at the brick sidewalk at the north entrance of the building leading to the alley. This walk is constructed from old sidewalk bricks donated by Don Burns and Larry Vititoe. A new trellis replaced the plastic windbreaker at this entry.

Work continues on the front porch. Tongue and groove boards were painted and installed on the ceiling. The next step is to build and paint the railing, then install it. This along with a new ceiling light and front storm door will complete the porch.

AWTHS is still \$13,000 in debt with \$3,771.61 in the checking account. Many members and supporters are donating \$100 each to help pay for supplies for restoration work. Grant money is also being sought for electrical/lighting and air conditioning for the first floor.

Please continue to bring in your aluminum cans and computer ink cartridges for recycling. This project brings in about \$125 a month.

Meet AWTHS Historians

Bill Gunder and Anita Short serve on our board as local historians. They have both spent endless hours in libraries and museum archives, browsing the internet, scanning courthouse records, and visiting cemeteries to record tombstone inscriptions. Old newspapers, journals, and many other types of documents have been read to gather information that has helped them record the history of our community. Their genealogical works are invaluable to those researching their own heritage and local history.

Anita and Bill have collaborated on the book "Arcanum, OH Fire Department 1877–1970". They work together; proofreading each others work, sharing both ideas and information. They are currently working on: Arcanum of Parades, Arcanum Opera House and Ivester Park & Chautauquas.

As a young woman, Anita's mother, Ruth Hoover Bowers was interested in her family history. Anita remembers countless visits to courthouses and libraries, as her mother traced their ancestry. "I grew up with, and was always around genealogy. I took classes in genealogy research, becoming a certified genealogist in the early 1960's", said Anita. "It was after I was married that I saw a need for a source to support Ohio genealogists. After thinking about this, Mother and I ventured into the publishing business; the quarterly periodical 'Gateway to the West, Ohio' was

born. Research for the magazine took me into almost every Ohio County. I was away from home as much as four days at a time during the nice weather. I wrote the articles and did book reviews. Mother cut the stencils and printed our magazine on a mimeograph, up to 50 pages per volume." As the circulation grew to between 2000 and 3000, the neighbor kids helped collate and staple the magazines together in the basement of Ruth's home. The covers were professionally printed.

A complete collection of the 45 volumes of "Gateway to the West, Ohio" was donated to the historical society by Rose Shilt of Brookville, Ohio.

Bill's story begins a little differently. Bill was not interested in genealogy until he retired, when he started searching for information about his grandfather. "Years earlier when my daughter Tamala was preparing a paper for her high school class, she asked if I was related to John Gunder, the founder of Arcanum", Bill recalls, "No, I told her my great-grandfather's name was William Gunder." Bill was to uncover historians had mistakenly identified the founder of Arcanum, it was William not John. Through painstaking research into William's descendant's journals and writings, which reached into Indiana and Illinois and as far away as Iowa, Bill pieced his heritage and the founding of Arcanum together. " Many of the children of William and their descendants were educated people", said Bill, "Authors, educators and musicians". They left a paper trail for Bill to correct history. "From the material I've collected during my research", Bill continued, "I hope to write two other local histories about William Gunder and his children."

Bill has published 2 books on local history: <u>The Secret Town</u>, The Story of the Founding of Arcanum, <u>Ohio</u> and Arcanum Public Library & Ivester House.

Besides working with Anita on the three books previously mentioned, more books are in the works: Brigadier General Edward Sigerfoos, Fast Horses, History of District 7 School in Ithaca and Arcanum Christmases. Bill is also preserving on CD Rom all photos known to exist relating to Arcanum, and all Gunder family photos.

Bill is a mechanical engineer with a minor in music and has also published 6 major books (two were printed in 4 different languages) and over 100 articles relating to the use of computers in manufacturing, business, construction and real estate property management.

AWTHS, and the people of Darke County, are very fortunate to have these two people who are so dedicated to documenting the history of Arcanum and the surrounding area. If you have early pictures relating to life in Arcanum please contact Bill.

Design Committee Report

Many changes have taken place at the historical house over the spring and summer months. Please stop by and take a look. Most weekday mornings someone is working and the door is open for visits. Second floor guest rooms 2, 3, 4 & 5 have refinished woodwork, the walls have been plastered, skimmed coated and freshly painted. The hallway and stairwell have been painted, and the bathroom has taken on a Victorian decor look. A vintage pedestal sink was donated, it is installed along with the original toilet and claw foot bath tub. All paint, flooring, wallpaper, light fixture and labor were donated by our volunteers.

Room 2 has wall to wall carpeting, donated by Life Styles Design, Greenville. The original floor stenciling in Room 4 has been clear-coated for protection. A brick boarder stenciled on the walls of this room was damaged but was reproduced by Joan Rench. Rooms 3 & 5 and the storage closet have freshly painted walls and floors. Now, work begins on the "West Wing". Please come and join us in finishing rooms 6, 7 and 8.

The first floor north room is nearly finished. A large cupboard was removed; the remaining cupboards still need to be painted. The woodwork is being refinished. Walls were plastered, primed, skim coated and painted. The floor has been clear-coated to preserve the original color. This room will be used for genealogy and also to display dining room furniture and other artifacts pertaining to the dining room. Eldean Lambert designed a stained glass transom for the exterior door.

Dave and JoAnne Hill donated a family chandelier which now graces the second room on the first floor.

The society received several large pieces recently. The Arcanum Public Library donated a display case filled with Marj Heyduck memorabilia of the 50's and 60's era. Remember? Dayton Racquet Company, Inc. The Story Continues

The story of the Dayton Racquet Company WWII defense work was shared with readers in the July AWTHS newsletter. It told of an Army-Navy E Award pennant presented to the company for excellent work during the years they made bolts for carbine rifles.

It was at the company auction, after it closed, that Elizabeth Stephens bought the pennant and an American flag. "The bidding for the flag and pennant was slow", recalled Liz, "I don't recall what I paid for the flags, but I really wanted them to stay in Arcanum". Liz donated the flag and pennant to the historical society after reading the story in our newsletter. The points of the pennant were tattered, but were easily mended by AWTHS seamstress, Joan Rench. The flag and pennant will be well taken care of in their new home. And, most important, they will help tell of an important time in Arcanum's history, and the history of our country.

Betty Murphy and Jean Hangen worked at the Racquet Company during the war effort. They were joined recently by Ellen Hangen, Pauline Allen, Phyllis Bunger and Marjorie Meyer for a photo with the Army-Navy pennant. They all worked at the company over the years. Pauline said she could still hear the machines running and feel how sore her fingers were from working on the racquets. Many agreed with her. Marj Meyers has her time card from the last day the company was in operation. She worked there for 35 years, Phyllis worked for the Mundays 25 years.

A scrapbook kept from the early days of the business was given to the historical society by Tom Staley, who purchased it at the auction. The scrapbook holds advertisements, price lists, articles from trade publications and pictures of stars and champions who used the steel racquets. Loretta Young, screen star and Fred Perry, tennis champion are shown playing badminton at Palm Springs, Calif. Tom also gave a display holder with 5 racquets. Other racquets were given by Larry Fourman, Phyllis Bunger and Ellen Hangen. Ted Munday gave another display holder. Phyllis also donated a Racquet Company auction bill and 1989 price list.

Marion (Shorty) Falknor, brother to Jean Hangen, recalls working for Louis Munday right out of high school, first repairing rackets then later with the war production. "I went to work on the second shift, coming into the plant one

evening with a load of repaired rackets", recalls Shorty, "I was confronted by a young lady (Frances), who later became my wife, that sent my rackets spilling all over the floor."

Arcanum was a prosperous village of 1,150 in 1934. Wanting to continue growth of the community and offer employment to the local people, a committee formed to solicit funds to aid in moving the factory from Dayton, and also to help defray costs of fixing up the building at 302 S. Albright St. Built in 1920 by the Quick Change Chuck Company, it was later used by Arcanum Livestock Exchange. Over 200 residents and businesses gave \$1,500 to bring the "Racquet Factory" to Arcanum. Although damaged by fire March 17, 1980 the company continued operation until 1995.

Richard (Dick) B. Munday acquired the Dayton Racquet Company from the Talbott family in 1931. Founded as a Talbott enterprise in 1920, the factory was located in the old Dayton Friction Toy Co. building on Hawthorne St.

Defense Work Brings Family to Arcanum

A family that moved to Arcanum to work at the Racquet Company was Bruce and Ann Kincaid, but not to make bolts. Frank Kincaid owned Kincaid Restaurant located at the corner of Main and George Streets during the time the Racquet Company began operating around the clock. Dick Kincaid, son of Bruce tells this story. Dick and Louie (Munday) came to Frank asking him to operate a cafeteria in the factory. At the time Frank felt he had all he could handle with the restaurant and recommended his brother, Bruce, for the job. Dad was living in Milford, OH at the time working at a dairy. He did not know anything about the food service business. Accepting the challenge, Dad, Mom and my sister Pauline moved to Arcanum. I was in the service at the time. The Racquet Company provided the space, but Dad and Mom furnished everything needed to fix three meals a day, including the stove and refrigerator. They went home to rest between shifts, then came back to fix a meal for the next group of hungry workers. Dad knew, when the war ended, he would have to find other work. At the time, Roger Warner was working at the racquet factory. He said to Dad, "You know, Arcanum doesn't have a dry cleaners". That put

the idea in Dad's head. I came to Arcanum after my service time was up. Dad and I opened Kincaid Kleeners Oct. 12, 1946."
