It was sold before a plan of purchase could be worked out. The library was organized on a subscription plan with members paying 50 cents per year for the privilege of membership.

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### Arcanum Public Library Centennial 2011

Much has happened to bring the Arcanum Public Library to its permanent home in the historic Ivester House. George Ivester and his family would be pleased to see the home he had built in 1875 maintained, preserving the beautiful woodwork & staircase, fireplaces and high ceilings, while adding spaces to create a welcoming atmosphere which provides for learning and enjoyment, and still keeping it's Victorian charm.

The ladies of the 1910 Arcanum Criterion Club, who first called the community together to form a public library, would be proud of local folks coming together time after time to keep the library going through growth, and also financial setbacks throughout the 100 years.

The biggest setback, and the one most remembered, was the devastating 1959 fire.

Following the fire many people and organizations from around the state came forth to help rebuild our library. That was greatly due to the efforts of Dayton Journal Herald columnist, Marj Heyduck. A resident of Wayne Lakes, Ms. Heyduck stopped each morning in Arcanum for coffee at the Korner Restaurant before boarding the bus for Dayton. Ms. Heyduck wrote often about the loss due to the fire. Soon gifts of books and money from Dayton, Greenville, Cincinnati, Troy, Celina, Versailles and many other locations came pouring in.

Ms. Heyduck was chosen as the dedication speaker in 1964. The story she wrote for her column describing the event began: "Many persons in the whole Miami Valley have a share in this small, neat library because they came forward to offer books from their own shelves when the rebuilding began even before the fire rubble had been cleared".

These many years later, people still donate books and money. No gift is too small; they all help keep the library operating.

Stories are told - memories are shared when people gather together for a special occasion. And such was the case June 12th when Arcanum Public Library Board of Trustees, Staff members, State, County and Village dignitaries, past employees, Criterion Club Members and library patrons gathered on the lawn to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the library.

After the presentation of a proclamation honoring the library's Centennial from the Ohio House of Representatives by State Rep. Richard Adams and State Senator William Beagle, Rep. Adams shared some of his memories.

Rep. Adams recalled as a child he was permitted to check out only two books at a time in his home town library. He would take his little sister with him to check out two books in her name even though they were for him, giving him four books to read instead of two. Does it surprise you that history and government were of special interest to him?

To Phil Garbig, past Library Trustee and Board President, it didn't seem long ago when he climbed the stairs to the second floor of the Weisenbarger Building, where the library was located at the time of the fire (1944-1959). After reading all the Hardy Boys books, he even read some of the Nancy Drew collection. When he was a little older Phil had a job delivering the Dayton Journal Herald. One of his customers was Eddie Troxel who lived in the Ivester house. Phil would go up to leave the paper at the door, with its beautiful rose colored window. Eddie would open the door quickly, scaring Phil every time. Eddie didn't scare the love of the historic house or the love of the library from Phil.

In awe of all the books in the library, Marilyn Rosser Strickler remembers thinking she would read every book there. A big idea for a little person.

As a girl growing up on a farm, Jean Munn-Hillis was never sure when she would be able to go to the library. Jean was always delighted when her Dad, Nerb Yohe, would take her along on his trip to the elevator in Arcanum. He left her at the library to browse and read while he took care of business.

Although JoAnne Hill has always had a love for reading, the library was part of her everyday life for 64 years in many ways. Her mother Mildred Pleasant was a trustee for 14 years. Following her death, JoAnne's husband Dave served on the board for the next 47 years.

JoAnne still has a few captain chairs used at the library when it was located in the old school on South Street (1926-1944) and then in the Weisenbarger Building. Mrs. Pleasant served on the board when it was decided to purchase new tables and chairs. She especially like the old captain chairs, so, she offered to purchase the new chairs if she could keep the captain chairs.

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### **Arcanum Library continues**

Dave was President of the Trustees at the time of the fire. JoAnne remembers the hours Dave, Clayton Star and others talking well into the nights, discussing the urgency to find a permanent home for the library. A concession for the purchase of the Ivester House from Eddie Troxel was to allow him to live in a small apartment in the north end of the building for the rest of his life.

During his tenure as Trustee, Dave was there to help with the 1964 purchase of the Ivester House. He helped with plans for an expansion, which was made possible from funds made available by the Archie Hanes Estate in 1980, and then in 1994 helped to oversee the West Wing Addition and Renovation.

Donna Lumpkin remembers the fire vividly. Seeing her father, Dick Kincaid, sitting on the roof of his business, Kincaid Dry Cleaners, with a garden hose all night, hoping to keep the fire from starting on the roofs east of the burning building.

Dick and his wife Gladys had finished remodeling the second floor of their home next to the Dry Cleaners. The devastating fire occurred before work began on the first floor. The family graciously offered the use of the first floor of their home to the library board for a new beginning.

Having the town library in ones home can be exciting to a young child. Donna and her sister, Mary Jo, were told by their parents they could not go into the library anytime they wanted to select a book, only during open hours.

During the move from the temporary location at 4 N. Main St., to the new library in the Ivester House, and then after the completion of each of the two additions, the books were hand moved by a human chain. Many in attendance for the centennial celebration could recall standing in line, handing books to each other, from the old location to the new, until all of the books were placed on the correct shelve in the correct sequence. Many Criterion ladies remember moving the books on four different occasions.

The library is more than a "place in which books and related materials are kept for use but not for sale". Director Marilyn Walden spoke of how the library today has evolved into an information station. Patrons use the computers for classes, employment applications and more. Some call the library for information about the community, such as 'What are the swimming pools hours' and 'When is the Halloween Parade?'. They may want a recipe or the correct spelling of a word. The staff is always ready to help.

Trustees Paul Myers told of the technology challenges facing the library staff today. Paul has seen the library from different angles, first coming for story time, then working as a Page while in high school and now serving on the Board. Paul stated about a third of the funding for the new computer system was raised with help from local organizations' donations, individual donations, library fundraiser, and anonymous donations.

The first stage of replacing the complete computers system has begun with the installation of computers for patrons' use. Marilyn noted with the overhaul and the installation of Time Warner Business Class system, our patrons will be "blown away" by the fast service. Although many have been generous in giving, more funds are needed to reach the goal set for this project.

A highlight during the celebration was the slide presentation relating to the history of the library prepared by local historian Bill Gunder. The slides shown on the new computer screens ran continuously after the program. Much information about the library is available today because of the dedication of Bill to preserve the history of Arcanum. The story of the library is documented in the book <u>Arcanum Public Library & Historic Ivester House</u>.

Stop in the library to look through the many photo albums showing various dedications and special activities which have taken place at the library over the years.

### \*\*\*\*\*Wayne Trail Grange Metal Chairs - Businesses in 1963\*\*\*\*\*

We continue a look back at businesses which made donations to the Grange when they moved into the Beck Hotel, now AWTHS *Arcanum Ceramic Studio*-Jane Fryman taught ceramic in her home at 408 W. 1st Street, which she shared with her husband Robert. Around 1963 she added a studio and sales room where she also sold flowers and plants. Betty Whittaker learn the art from Jane, then started her own business, B. J. Ceramics. Edith Baker enjoyed painting ceramics with Jane so much, that after all these years, daughter Joan Rench is still selling pieces her mother made at her Spring and Christmas sales.

*Arcanum Elevator*-The elevator, which stood at 207 S. Sycamore Street, began in 1919 as the Arcanum Equity Exchange Company. At the time the donation was made to the Grange, .John Montgomery and John Trittem were proprietors, with Trittem as manager, . Montgomery knew the Beck Hotel well as he lived there for many years. In 1966 the Elevator was sold, becoming the second plant for the John Smith Grain Company to use as a bulk fertilizer facility.
