Donating Library or Research Acquisitions

We love and appreciate quality reference materials. However, we are currently running out of room in our downstairs library room. We would ask for now to please wait on donations in this area until we can reorganize some materials or obtain more space. Digital copies of photos are still being accepted.

We encourage all making donations now or in the future to please follow a few basic guidelines: items need to pertain to Southern Darke County (2) items are not duplicate (check our reference list on web site or ask (3) and items be in good shape when donating. Please call before donating. Old crumbling newspapers are really not useable. We do have a "wish list"-just ask!

We have plenty of copies of old newspapers from the 1950 celebration, the 1950's and 1960's basketball teams and the Arcanum tornado. Thank you. This will help free up space for new acquisitions.

Researching Your Old House

This is a question our historical society is asked frequently. People move into the community, especially Arcanum, and ask about the history of their house or property. The age of house, who lived there and events are common starters and important to find out.

First we recommend looking at your property deed or title. If you only have the last seller you will need to start at the local courthouse in the recorders department. A search needs to be done of past home owners and years of purchase.

Second, talk to surrounding neighbors and residents of the town where you purchased. If someone has lived in the same place or address for a number of years, they might know about your current house and have stories about the past owners or even old photos. Contacts and networking are important.

Third, once you have a list of past property owners, look for the names in the census records. We have some of these books at AWTHS Reference Library. Other sources or places to look include: Arcanum or Greenville Public Library, the Darke Genealogical Society at Garst in Greenville and looking on-line thru Family Search or Ancestry.

Fourth, look in old newspapers for the names or addresses of the property. AWTHS has limited info from the Arcanum Newspapers. Other libraries may have papers on microfilm.

Fifth, google the names on the internet and see what search engines can find. Those who have researched their family's history and worked on family trees may have already found this information. Their search may not include all the names in the deeds but every find is a gold mine. In searching also put out inquires for old photos of the property or the family.

These are a few starters to get you pointed in the right direction. Please consider a copy of your report for the AWTHS library files.

“in love and fidelity, George Sprecher Civil War Letters”

AWTHS recently received the book “*in love and fidelity, George Sprecher Civil War Letters*” from Larry F. Carter, great- great grandson of George Sprecher.

Mr. Sprecher, an Arcanum resident, wrote to his wife, Sarah Ann Renshaw Sprecher, during his time in the military writing nearly every other day. The book contains transcribed copies of these letters and other documents.

George was mustered into the Ohio 34th Regiment Volunteer Infantry, Company K in November of 1861 at the age of 53. The army was looking for volunteers for the Medical corp. He volunteered for that because it paid 25 cents more than the regular foot soldier.

The book contains transcribed copies of the letters he wrote to his wife giving her instructions on running their mercantile store as well as the post office both located in Arcanum. Mr. Sprecher wrote about his camp life, including many individuals from Arcanum and Greenville. He talks of some battles his unit fought in. George mustered out October 1864.

It is interesting to learn the Arcanum family names of the men serving with Sprecher. George lists names of those he knew of who were wounded or killed in 34th Regt. OVI Companies C, D, E, F, G July 1864, also Companies A, B, C, D, F, and G in a battle near Winchester, VA, Sept. 19, 1864

Sarah was a strong woman, enabling her to carry on the responsibilities of running the business and post office as well as raising their family for 3 years by herself. In a letter to George she tells of a fight she had to break up between two women in their store..

A map sent with the book indicates George owned property on what is now the downtown parking lot and also near the Rose Post, both on George Street.

The book is available for research in our library. It is also available at the Arcanum Public Library.

Horseshoe pitching – A yard game enjoyed by generations – before cornhole

I knew Harold Anthony during 21 years while I was active in the Darke County Horseshoe Club. Harold was affectionately known as the “paddle guy” and “Mel” to our group. During organized pitching there is a scoreboard on every court. Each scoreboard has a “paddle” with the player’s name. Harold was the guy who made the paddles in his home workshop.

This activity may sound trivial, but Greenville used to host: summer leagues, Ringer Classic (open to all players across the US and Canada), Ohio championship. Tournaments each day at the Darke County Fair, Darke County club tournament, winter leagues and the Snowball Open.

Some of these tournaments drew close to 300 pitchers. Making the paddles was one task, the other was to get them ready for scoreboards as each class was due to take the courts. Those of us who worked in the office would make up the classes and pass the names along to Harold.

Since it was a family sport you might, for example, have three people from the same family in competition. For example, George, Thelma and Brian Neff.

Harold also was known as “Mel”. Things have changed recently, but for many years the horseshoe club used the Chicken Kitchen building at the fair grounds for winter pitching. They would take out sections of the concrete floor to install three courts and also put in temporary heat. Leagues were pitched most nights and a Snowball Tournament was held over several weekends.

During the tournament there was a need for limited food service. Don’t know why, but Harold was tasked with food service. There was a TV show that featured Mel’s Diner. The name stuck. Harold was content to watch the pitching and crank out hot dogs, burgers, chips, soda and candy. Mostly in an electric frying pan.

During the summer months his wife Marge joined us. Didn’t know the rest of his kids, but Jerry used to pitch when he was a teen. He won the Ohio boy’s junior championship in 1970.

Editor’s note: The Darke County Horseshoe Club is in its 60th year continuing to host many of the same tournaments. The club uses the Domestic Arts Building on the site of the former Chicken Kitchen for winter pitching.

Dreamland Theatre William and Harry Chancellor , Proprietors

Located at 108 West George Street the Dreamland Theatre opened in 1907. The theatre was part of the Arcanum life and business community for many years. The name was changed to Ritz Theatre in 1927. The following are excerpts from the book “Arcanum, Ohio Business History (1852 thru 1968) written by Anita Short.

The first full length showing began August 7, 1907 and was the Pathe hand-colored “The Life of Christ Passion Plays” which were shown in serial series over a week’s time.

The theatre would show many films still recognized as classics of their time. Two examples include “Wizard of Oz” which was shown at the Ritz on November 17-18-19, 1939 and “Gone with the Wind” being shown on April 2-3-4-5-6, 1941.

William (Bill) Chancellor passed away at his home on West First Street on March 29, 1953, unmarried. Harry had married late in life and continued to run the Ritz, possibly hoping to obtain 50 years of service to the community. However, the new “Drive-In theatres” were hurting the admissions at large movie houses, and a small local market could not withstand the economics of time.

The large film projector and ticket booth used at the Ritz are on display at AWTHS. Stop in to see them.

The theatre was located in the building which is now Tom Wetzel’s antique store, “The Olde Nostalgia Shoppe”.

Arcanum Preservation Society Up Date

The **Arcanum Preservation Society, Inc.** has been hard at work. The Facilities committee has been granted access to the old town hall to start the process of measuring the rooms to do detailed CAD drawings so that we can start to formulate restoration plans. The Finance committee has completed and submitted the paperwork for the 501c3 and is working on putting together their plan for fundraising (grants, sponsors, etc). The Heritage committee is working on gathering historical data about the old town hall as well as searching for old photos to help with restoration accuracy. The recently formed Membership committee is getting established by beginning work on a membership drive. The Communications, Events & Social Presence committee has been working on community presence, looking for ways to work with other organizations and businesses in town.

APS has started working on some exciting upcoming events including a Logo Art Contest with the students from Arcanum and Franklin-Monroe high schools. We will hold a reception the Saturday of Old Fashioned Days May 16th from 1-4pm at AWTHS where we will announce the winner. Be sure to watch for information to be released about other upcoming events.

APS’ monthly member meetings are held on the 2nd Wednesday of each month at 7pm.
