Women's Right to Vote **** 1920 Ratification of the 19th Amendment Suffrage Slogan: Forward through the Darkness, Forward into Light

September 2, 1920 Arcanum Times "Getting Onto The Game"

Since the passage of the Amendment to the U.S. constitution granting suffrage to women, some of the feminine citizens of Arcanum are wading into polities with a zest. In a conversation between two ladies which was overheard on the street Saturday evening one was heard to remark: "I certainly am going to vote dry at his election". Her companion, who was evidently of the same political faith, agreed with her and added: "And I'll not vote for a man who says 35 cents is enough for a bushel of wheat." The Chinese puzzle: Who will get their votes?

September 9, 1920 Arcanum Times "Arcanum Women May Vote Sept. 20"

They (women) will be privileged to cast their first ballot on September 20, when the matter of a bond issue for a fire truck comes before the voters.---- As a rule it is the women who suffer most from fires and better fire protection and more modern firefighting equipment will appeal strongly to them.

November 4, 1920 Arcanum Times "Fire Truck Bond Issue Carries by Big Majority"

The newly enfranchised women voters had no small part in making the decision so strong for the bond issue, fully fifty percent of the votes cast being voted by the women.

November 4, 1920 "Women Voters Take Honors at Election"

Running true to form and upholding the reputation of always getting the first and last word in every argument, Arcanum women in the election Tuesday cast both the first and last vote.

Mrs. Harry Kester took the honor of casting the first votein town, getting her vote into the boxes at 5:45 a.m. at a time when many male voters in Arcanum had made their first turn over preparatory to arising from the night's sleep. Mrs. D. E. Etzler cast the last vote.

There was some doubt about the number of votes that would be cast by the women, but at the election Tuesday it was clearly demonstrated that they are just as interested in the results as the men, the normal vote of the town being practically doubled. Another surprise to the men voters was the intelligent way in which the women went about voting, one election official estimating that fewer women votes were thrown out then men.

Early Wooden Voting Box

A wooden voting box was recently donated to us by the Village Administration. It was found in the old City Hall and Opera House when village employees and Arcanum Preservation Society members were clearing out the last of the records and other village belongings, moving them to the new municipal building. This is an exciting find especially on the occasion of the 100th anniversary of Women Suffrage. Could this be the voting box into which Mrs. Etzler or Mrs. Kester dropped their ballot?
