President's Report

Continued work on the interior of the Arcanum Wayne Trail Historical Society building has taken place this winter. The kitchen is nearly completed whereas the stairway and second floor is under massive remodeling.

Lonnie Norris and his team of workers have installed new ceiling board in several of the rooms, stairway and hallway. The ceilings are then plastered by Richard Rinehart. After the wallpaper is striped the cracks and holes in the walls are filled with joint compound and sanded smooth when dry. This is very labor intensive. Help is needed to refinish the woodwork as was done on the first floor. Half or more of the second floor should be completed by this summer.

The front porch ceiling and railing should be finished this spring as well as the second floor window exterior finishing molding installed. Further exterior tuck pointing and brick replacement is still needed before the "soft" bricks can be sealed.

This winter the old inefficient furnace is still functioning; however, the gas bills are rather high relative to the mild temperatures. A contract has been made with Fourman's Heating and Cooling for the new furnace with an efficiency of 92% and a cost of \$3000 should be installed. The furnace will be AC compatible. Please note AWTHS will be \$500 short with the \$2500 grant money received.

If you will notice on the main floor donor's plaques for each of the new windows are being stalled. Twenty-two windows have been paid for. Contact me if you would like to donate \$500 for the last window. Thanks! Now donations are needed to complete the first floor electrical work

Design Committee Report By Carolyn Furlong

When will the kitchen be finished? Stop by for a visit and check it out.

After the walls were repaired, painting was done by Lonnie Norris, Tim Todd, Ralph Holsapple and Keith Fourman. The "high" chair rail was stained by Dave Hill and installed by Dave Flora. Stenciling and floor paint was applied by Joan Rench, Carolyn Furlong, and Carolyn Troutwine. Curtain valances and area rag rugs were fashioned by Joan Rench. A "Sellers" kitchen cabinet is on loan to the society from the Rench family. Gregg Meyer refinished the kitchen sink, and Connie and Lonnie Norris donated a ceiling light and fan.

The large island in the "summer kitchen" was divided into two complete units and painted by Dave Hill. Boards cut from a large beam salvaged by Gene Rench many years ago from an old Arcanum warehouse and stored for years were used for the countertops. Dennis Benedict assembled and planed both counter tops. The tops were stained by Keith and clear coated by Steve Garber. One unit is placed along the south kitchen wall and the other serves as the island work area.

Some other changes since the last newsletter are the three stained glass transom windows in the community room and back kitchen. They were designed and donated by Bud Cooper and Eldene Lambert.

The second floor is a work in progress. Richard Reinhart has finished plastering the east rooms, hall, closet, bathroom and stairwell. Dick and Fred Troutwine and Dean Pitzer have been busy repairing smaller areas. Donations are needed to purchase blue boards for the ceilings in the west rooms. Richard will then be back to plaster those rooms. The doors are being refinished one by one. Call Dick, Fred or Keith to help refinish doors or woodwork.

The Design Committee is looking for period Victorian furnishings for the first two rooms of the historical building. Trojan State Class B Champions

It is no secret Arcanum High School has had many gifted athletes. Guided by outstanding coaches, inspired by teachers, encouraged by loving parents, and supported by faithful fans, the young men of the 1956 basketball team not only won games, but gained the respect of their community as well. Today, many of the players and cheerleaders remain in Arcanum, supporting and mentoring the present group of athletes. Kevin O'Dell, a member of the 1976 team that was defeated in the State semifinals by Pettisville, coaches the boy's reserve team. His brother, Randy, is the girl's varsity basketball coach. His father, Richard, played on the 1956 team. It is not uncommon to see this generational connection in our sports program.

One only has to look at the trophy cases throughout the school to see the accomplishments of our fine athletes. This year is a milestone in men's basketball as the school celebrates the victory and state championship of the 1956 team fifty years ago. This team defeated Willshire 55–54 in the semifinals, and Columbus St. Mary's in the finals by a score of 72–71 in the Cleveland Arena for the state Class B crown. The town has never forgotten that day! (A loss to the New Madison Mohawks that year prevented a perfect season).

The migration of fans headed north to Cleveland on Thursday morning to witness the games and promise of bringing back to Arcanum "the biggest trophy the people had ever seen." Hidden in a secluded motel, the team prepared mentally for the task ahead. Coming in as underdogs and being dubbed by various newspapers as "the little pauper," "Cinderella Club," "farm youngsters from little Arcanum," and "corn fed cagers," these players were well aware of the challenges ahead. "Anybody got a stepladder?" the paper stated in reference to Gary Kessler, the Willshire "giant" whose height was recorded anywhere from 6'9" to 6'11" with weight of 215 lbs. Kessler averaged 34.6 points per game with a "splurge" of 50 points in the finals of the regional game. The Trojans, however, were prepared and confident. "Willshire and Arcanum had the crowd of 8,886 fans on the edges of their seats throughout the final period," the paper said. "Arcanum out rebounded Willshire 40-22 and Gary Kessler ended with just 16 points, thanks to the brilliant defense set up by Coach Harter." Victory!

The second game was equally challenging as Columbus St. Mary's came in the favorite. In the end, "The farm youngsters from little Arcanum High School stamped "mission accomplished" on their basketball season at 3:24 p.m. yesterday by a margin of just one point with a score of 72–71," the reporter wrote. People may

remember that Arcanum didn't even have a gymnasium that year. The Trojans played all of their games on other floors. "We rented different gyms, any available in our area. As a result, we weren't bothered at all by strange floors," Coach Harter stated. He thought that might have been an advantage for his team. However, the headlines in the paper the next day told of the frantic last seconds of the game. "Trojans' Strategy Almost Backfires—Troutwine Bats Ball, but In Wrong Direction; Clock Then Nips Foe's Scoring Bid." After the game, Coach Harter simply said, "It didn't work out quite as we expected, but was good enough to get the job done." Victory!

While the coach was being interviewed and the net cutting ceremony was over, a messenger came from the locker room. "The boys are waiting for you coach," he said. "They want you to say a prayer." The paper goes on to report that he hurried off to share the "biggest athletic moment of all for himself, his boys, and little Arcanum, and to lead their prayer of thanksgiving."

"Arcanum's Champions Are Welcomed Home By 20,000," the headlines of the Greenville paper read. It was "the largest spontaneous gathering in Darke County's history- 15,000-20,000 persons welcoming home the Arcanum Trojans." They traveled on St. Rt. 36 from Bradford through Greenville and into Arcanum. County and city officials congratulated the team on the steps of the county courthouse in Greenville. In their hometown they were greeted by a swarm of family and friends who honored the boys with a parade complete with the explosions of "bombs" behind the school. "Following the police escort was a tractor bearing the slogan, " Corn Fed Cagers." Cars with "Glenn Harter for President", "Terry Norris for Mayor" and "Rex Karns for Sheriff" followed. The homecoming celebration was sponsored by the Lions Club with Harold Kreitzer heading up the committee. It was at this reception that Coach Harter was presented with the keys to a new Chevrolet, a gift of appreciation from the community of Arcanum.

And so... the memories of this glorious moment in Arcanum's history linger for many today. You may have your own stories or old newspaper clippings to share and pass on to the next generation. Everyone remembers Mayor Ernest Fisher's faith in the Trojan team. Owner of the Arcanum Aluminum Foundry, he had cast and polished a huge key days before the finals. This key was presented to Coach Harter at the homecoming reception. You may also remember 83-year-old, Mrs. Bertha Brehm and the string of rabbit's feet she wore, and at times waved during exciting moments. We think she may have been the oldest fan to travel to Cleveland. It was written that LaJeanne Etzler was three years old at the time, (her sister, Sharon Etzler was a cheerleader) and the youngest fan to attend

the tournament. Ironically, she was a cheerleader for the Trojan 1969 Class A State Champion team. Do you remember the black fedora hats the team wore in the parade? They all matched symbolizing a united team effort. Their coach emphasized hard work and personal motivation, hard play to the last moment, (he always said, "games are not won or lost until the final second has ticked away!"), loyalty to team members and coach, cooperation, and sportsmanship.

Coach Harter told his team he was looking for boys who would believe in this maxim: "Fundamentals, plus hustle, plus team play, equal a championship team." His players did not let him down!

Films of the final games exist. Athletes of today would not believe the changes that have occurred over the past 50 years. The first noticeable differences are the uniforms. "Don't tell me you wore those short shorts as uniforms Gramps," Fred Troutwine's granddaughter commented. "Oh yes, and I also shot my foul shots underhanded "Granny" style," he told her as she laughed and rolled her eyes. This is typical of the many discussions they have had as they compare the game of basketball in the "olden days" with the game of today. "The game is faster paced now and maybe more physical. Whereas elbows fly today in attempts to get the ball, it is alleged that the 1956 team had a guard who harassed players by pulling the hair on their legs to get the advantage. (A little more subtle than the shoving we see in the games today)," he tells her as he hands her a copy of the same booklet of expectations Coach Harter gave the 1956 Trojan Team.

Only A Shell Remains

This barn housed race horses. I never saw them race but when I was small John still had a horse or two in this barn.

Gordon, Ohio, where this barn is still located, and where I was born, was a bustling village of a hundred or two families between 1848, when the village was platted, and 1860. There was a man, south of town, who did have a race track built for horse races and no doubt John Hanes raced his horses there.

And people came from cities as far away as Dayton, Ohio, on the Dayton and Union (D&U) railroad, when it began running passenger trains, just to see the races. They would get off and visit the tavern run by Bryan Kitt, (where the Women's Christian Temperance Union would later set off two sticks of dynamite and blow the doors down) for a drink or cross the street and visit Sam Jones' butcher shop and set down to coffee, or tea and a sandwich.

Ladies in big flowing dresses and sprouting umbrellas walked beside men in dark suits and shined shoes with spats. Imagine that. At the same time, the streets were dirt or mud (depending on the weather) and little Ruth Rice, the blacksmith's

daughter, was out on the street hulling corn and feeding piglets on Perry Street, opposite the train station.

When I took this photograph, the other day, I remembered that John had a large woods as clean as a park on the right side of this barn, and that it was home to the annual "Virginia Reunions", and then the croquet court was full of ladies and gentlemen laughing and smoking and knocking balls through wickets. I was not a relative of anybody at any reunion held there but as a kid I could go anywhere. And the sound of an airplane was more than enough to attract my attention. So I was there the day a bi-plane landed and took people at the reunion rides for the ungodly sum of \$5.00. I never got to fly. I didn't have money. Five dollars came after mother spent a month washing and ironing Herb Hamel's clothes. But some people always had money and flew off into the blue. I was just fortunate to have lived then and can remember how life was when I was a little boy.
