President's Report by Fred Troutwine

If you recall, in the July newsletter, I stated one of the goals of the Board is to pay off our debt by the 2010 January Membership Meeting. I sincerely believe this is within reach! As of July 31, 2009, our note was \$3,964.56. With our profits from our recent fundraisers (\$1025.00 from the Rt 127 Yard Sale and \$900.00 from the Fair Gate), we are rapidly approaching a large payment possibility.

Your Board, after much discussion, has decided that our next capital improvement project for the House is the replacement of the 21 limestone windowsills on the outside of the building. We are seeking grants to help defray the cost of this multi-year project expected to be approximately \$14,600, replacing the most severely damaged first. Water damage may occur if these sills are not replaced, causing concern for the newly renovated walls and ceilings.

The programs and special events this year have been spectacular, bringing many new people to the Historical House. This has not only been heartwarming, but an encouragement that people in our community are appreciative of all our efforts. It's been the spontaneous, creative ideas that have made this year so special.

In an effort to keep this momentum going, we need to be thinking of people who will be willing to carry on with the leadership of this great organization. Basically, the major physical work on the building is complete. It is my hope that someone will be willing to step into the Vice-Presidency and, in turn, decide to run for President the following year. We all want AWTHS to go forward with continued focus on the mission statement of: *collecting and preserving of records, artifacts, memorabilia, materials, and genealogical research pertaining to the history of the Arcanum area.* Please consider sharing your talents for the continued success of the Society.

The Shields Family History - submitted by Carolyn Furlong

(continued from the July newsletter)

The first Patrick Shields (Old Pat) passed away in 1877 at the age of 92. Patrick had 19 children. In my direct line, was his son, Isaac, who married Elizabeth Rust Shields and from that marriage there were 13 children, one was my great, great, grandfather, Patrick (Young Pat) Shields.

Following is a biographical sketch of Patrick S. Shields, son of Isaac and Elizabeth Rust, taken from the book "History of Darke County, Ohio", W. H. Beers, Chicago, 1880, page 733.

Patrick Shields, farmer: P. O. Delisle: was born in Preble County, Ohio in 1831; his parents, Isaac and Elizabeth Shields had born unto them thirteen children of whom ten are now living; his father and mother were natives of Preble County. Mr. Shields was the second child of his parents and came with them to Darke County in 1838, and located in Van Buren Township, where he has lived to the present time, with exception of three years in which lived north of here about fifteen miles.

In 1853 Mr. Shields was united in marriage with Mary J., daughter of Caleb and Mary Brown; to them have been born eight children, all of whom are now living, three boys and five girls, viz., Nancy, Mary Alice, Caleb, Elisabeth, William L., Laura May, Ada and Donovan F. Mr. Shields, though not one of the oldest, but yet an early settler says he remembers well of the many hunts after wolves, bears and various kinds of game, which were then plentiful; Mr. Shields commenced farming twenty-seven years ago with a capital of \$80, one cow and half a dozen chickens and from this small beginning, has, by industry, frugality, skill and management advanced step by step toward success, till now he is owner of 221 acres of land, all under cultivation, and as good land as any in the township; has a good two-story frame house, nearly new and everything convenient and comfortable. During all this labor, Mr. Shields paid in support of the war of the rebellion about \$1,600; he is still a man of middle age, and with the fine competency has obtained the ability with which he handles his means, the industrious habits and interesting family he has to help him on, he will in all probability arise to a prominence among the residence of the county; he is a living example in correct business habits for his children and future generations in time to come.

A son, Caleb was born to Patrick and Mary and he moved with his parents, brothers, and sisters to the farm just a half mile west of Delisle, Van Buren Twp, Arcanum, Ohio. He was 4 years old and he lived there for the rest of his life. He married Hannah Myers and they had 4 children. Raymond, Clifford, Ethel and Edith. Hannah passed away in 1900 when her youngest child Edith, my grandmother, was only four years old. Caleb never remarried.

Edith married Charles Patterson in 1914 and my father Richard Patterson was born in 1918. He was their only child. They remained on the farm with Caleb and they cared for Edith's ailing father in his later years. I do remember Great Grandpa Caleb. He passed away in 1943. Edith and Charles Patterson lived on the farm for over 70 years and Richard, my father, was raised there. Edith died in 1976 and Charles in 1981. My father, Richard and my mother, Mary Lou Gilbert were married in 1940 and I was born a year later and in 1955 my brother Rick was born. Richard died in 1986 and Mary Lou in 1994. Keith and I now live on that same farm that Patrick Shields brought his family in 1861. Keith and I have 3 children, Kelly Furlong Baron, Kurt Patterson Furlong, and Karen Furlong Young. We have 6 grandchildren and they are the 10th generation of the Shields Family.

A Farewell

It is with sadness that we note the passing of member Ella Kay Stevenson. Ella and her husband John have been supportive of AWTHS.

Business History of West George Street (First Block, North Side)

Most of us think of the buildings that make up the first block of West George Street as “the bank”, “the dance studio”, “Eilerman’s Insurance” and “Sink Jewelry”. Today these are the businesses from the corner to the alley on the north side of the street.

In 1888 the bank building was known as the T. D. Smith Building. Theophilus Douglas (Doug), Son of John Smith of the John Smith Big Store, had the three-story brick building constructed with two separate business rooms, each having separate entrances. The east room was 1 W. George, the west room 3 W. George.

Greenville Journal reported May 29, 1885 “T. D. Smith has his banking room nearly ready for occupancy. It is neatly finished and we understand they have nearly enough stock taken to commence business.”

That was the beginning of the Farmers and Merchants Banking Company, Inc. A time line shows Farmers and Merchants Banking moving to 24 W. George St. in 1907.

There was only one time the building was not used as a bank. Olivia C. Nuse-McCafferty occupied the banking room from 1907 until 1918 or 1919 at which time she moved her millinery shop to the Weisenberger Store.

It was then that Arcanum Building & Loan Association moved to 1 W. George from 12 N. High St. Later, in 1936, the name was changed to Arcanum Federal Savings and Loan Association. The bank building was still owned by the Smith family in 1947 when Arcanum Federal Savings & Loan Association purchased it.

In 1991 Second National Bank became the third owner when the bank purchased most of the loans and assumed the insured deposits of Arcanum Federal Savings and Loan Association from Resolution Trust Corporation. (Second National Bank was organized in Greenville in 1883.) Second National Bank also has an Arcanum branch located at 602 N. Main St.

Major changes were made to the building in the 1970s when Federal Savings and Loan expanded into the west office space closing in the exterior door and windows of that section. RJ Warner Insurance Services was the last business to occupy the small office space at 3 W. George St. The exterior of the entire building was renovated in 1996.

Today, 124 years since this banking room opened for business Arcanum residents and many from surrounding communities continue to do their banking in this historic building.

Some other businesses that occupied the small west section which residents may remember are the Little Dress Shop (Mildred Browder later Louise Grube), Donald L. Brehm, Watchmaker, Furlong Shoe Repair (Emerson), Simpson Drug Store, Garrison and Son, Florists, and I. H. Flory Plumbing. Old timers may remember going to the Arcanum Public Library next to the bank (1915-1926).

The organizations to occupy the second floor of the T. D. Smith Building beginning in 1886 were Arcanum Enterprise (newspaper). Grand Army of Republic (GAR) and GAR Ladies Relief Corps meet there, following that it was used as a banquet room for the Knights of Pythias. Between Nov. 1944 and Nov. 1945 the rooms were used by Arcanum (Youth) Recreation Center - “The Arc”. Arcanum Lions Club met there from 1947 until early 90s. The third floor was used by Knights of Pythias

Tip Tap Toe studio is in the building which Peter Fox had constructed for his pharmacy in 1963. Fox tore down two structures at 5 & 7 W. George St., Etzler Barber Shop and Leonard Ary’s Candy Store, and also a double residence at 104 N. Main St. The huge pharmacy had entrances on George and N. Main Sts. Pharmacist Neil Stump joined Fox in 1970, purchasing the business in 1975 and continued serving Arcanum until March 1989. A sequence of owners after Peter Fox was Savings and Loan, Craig Dynes, Robert Mikesell and presently Russell Hackworth.

The studio is owned by Tanya Mikesell and Kristie Geiger. The ladies teach tap, acrobat, jazz and ballet as well as competition cheerleading. The sisters began their studio on North High St. 17 years ago before moving to this location.

Eilerman Insurance Agency Inc. has been located at 9 W. George since 1992. Mark and Lois Eilerman brought their family to Arcanum in 1977. Starting with an office in their home, they launched an insurance agency which continues to grow. Son Kevin and nephew David Eilerman oversee the main office in Eaton, Ohio.

James Arthur Crouse opened Crouse Store for Men and Boys at this location in 1948. After working with Art for a couple years Harry Ogle purchased the store in 1972 and continued until 1985 when he went out of the clothing store business. Prior to the clothing store the building was used by a succession of bakeries owned by Frank Koogler, Maurice Harter, Kenneth Frye and Mr. and Mrs. Roger Shepherd. This building was erected in 1906 by Jacob Zipperlen.

The next building on the block was moved to 11 W. George that same year and became part of the Zipperlen Block. The façade of both buildings have been changed over the years, today they appear to be one structure. Sink Jewelers own the buildings.

Continue George Street

Sink Jewelers has been at 11 W. George St. since 1951. Bob managed “Fritz E. Martin, Jeweler” before becoming the owner and changing the name to Robert D. Sink, Jeweler. Bob’s son Dan continues the business today. Kroger Grocery & Baking Company occupied the building for 20 years, until 1950. For a short time Kincaid’s Restaurant (Jack) and Sharp’s Restaurant (Donald & Gwen) were at this location.

There is a connection between the bank building and the building Sink Jewelers occupies. When the Banking Company moved to their newly constructed building at 24 W. George in 1906, an old structure that sat on one of the lots was moved to 11 W. George St. Sink Jewelers is in the building which was moved, the building dates back to the 1880s.
