## Program: March Membership Meeting - March 11, 2010 at 7:00 p.m. - Friend or Foe?

For the answer, come to the March Membership Meeting and listen to a panel of former area tobacco growers' talk about such things as the destructive hornworm. Hear their stories of preparing the seed as well as planting, topping, cutting, curing, stripping, and eventually selling their "labor intensive" crop. Oh how we miss the sights of the tractors inching along slowly as the tobacco planters painstakingly put thousands of tobacco plants in long rows. The driver, turned and facing backward, kept a watchful eye over the planting process.

Want to learn about the art of tobacco farming? Possibly you were one who raised tobacco and have a story to share. Our evening of information and reminiscing promises to be very interesting. Dale and Betty Sease along with Joan Rench and Gerald and Sandy Brehm will lead the discussion with information, photos, and a display of items that were used in the tobacco growing process. Gerald and Sandy have a CD produced by Ed Johnston of ABN detailing their raising and handling of the tobacco crop.

Questions will be raised as to why we no longer consider tobacco a viable crop...what happened? What about the hornworm? How significant was it? Most importantly will be an explanation of the history of tobacco raising in this area.

### Renovations: Limestone Window Sill Project – Keith Furlong 548-6556

Several months ago, the AWTHS Board approved the replacement of the limestone window sills. Of the 22 sills, 20 have deteriorated to the point of needing to be replaced. Previous attempts to repair them have proven to be ineffective. Several of the sills have large chunks of limestone missing, thereby allowing water to seep into the brick structure. This needs to be rectified to prevent further damage to the bricks. This will also stop the white limestone leaching down the side of the building.

In addition, five lentils above the windows are also in need of repair. This will be done with a special resurfacing compound.

The old sills must be carefully removed and new custom made sills, by Gregory Stone Co. in Dayton, installed, mortared, caulked and sealed. The surrounding bricks must be reinstalled or replaced. A local stone mason, J. D. Hill, will be performing this restoration.

The material and labor for each window sill will be about \$600 or \$12,000 and \$2,500 for the lentils. The total cost for the project will be about \$15,000.

Restoration has already begun with three windows on the west side and one on the east side now complete. Work will resume next spring when the weather is warmer.

It is the Board's desire not to borrow any money. The completion of this ambitious project is dependent on current cash flow. We are waiting on the results of a submitted grant. Also a couple of donations for this project have been received and are very much appreciated.

## **Business History of W. George Street**

#### **13 West George Street**

An early 1990s photo of this building shows a two story brick structure. It had two businesses, 13 and 15 W. George. First business listed in Anita Short's Arcanum business book at number 13 was Kester Furniture and Undertaking. From then until 1953, the year a fire destroyed the entire structure; there were furniture makers, a bowling alley, saloons, restaurant and groceries & meat markets. Most businesses stayed only a few years.

Roy Sutton purchased the land from the Adam Stockum family estate in 1954. Work began immediately to clear the fire debris. A modern building encompassing both lots was soon ready for Sutton's Thrift "E" Super Market to move from the south side of George St.

Roy had been in the grocery business since 1936. The new store was operated by son Benjamin (Ben). When the store began an affiliation with Super Value in 1960 the name was changed to Sutton's Super Value.

Then, in 1976, Ben and his wife Janet (Bolinger), along with sons Scott and Kirby, opened the grocery in a new and larger building at 605 N. Main St. Kirby's daughter Shala is the fourth generation to be part of the business which is in the 84<sup>th</sup> year serving Arcanum.

Richard and Judy Kemp purchased the building from the Suttons and opened the Art Gallery Buffet. A few years later the restaurant was sold to Mr. Benken. The ownership then went to Harry and Carolyn Siculan for their contact lens distribution center, Bradford Optical. The business was started in their home on North Street. It wasn't long when the house next door was purchased for the growing business. In 1996 Bradford Optical moved to George St. Still needing a larger distribution center, the next move was to St. Rt. 571 East.

Katie (Boston) Smith rented from the new owner, Dan Burns, in the early 2000s. Her dance studio was later relocated across the street to 102 W. George St. Jody Burns currently owns the building which is vacant and for sale. **15 West George Street** 

Prior to the 1950 fire which destroyed the businesses and building on lots 13 and 15, a hardware store was at this location since 1899. The succession of owners was Warren Spitler & Mr. Cloppert: E. E. Olwine & F. M. Tullis: Walter O. Moore: Clayton Houk & Jess D. Miller and Roy H. Bromagen.

The second floor above 13 & 15 W. George St. was used for various sports from 1908 until the 1953 fire: pool, billiard and bowling. There is reference to a business, Arcanum Bottling works; proprietors were Howard "Johnny" Floyd & Leo Puterbaugh.
