Ice and snow caused the cancellation of the February board meeting and the scheduling of my meetings with committee chairpersons. March was my first board meeting to oversee, giving me a chance to exchange ideas for the coming months with our board members.

We are currently looking into the feasibility of air conditioning the rooms on the first and second floors.

I want to thank Annette Stewart for serving as corresponding secretary for the past two years. Annette has been very influential in the development our Southern Darke County History and Reference Library. Annette will continue to serve in this capacity, working with our historian Bill Gunder

Also, I want to welcome Gayla Metzcar to the board, she will now be our corresponding secretary. Gayla has done a great job as program chairman this past year and we are happy she will continue in this position.

The purpose of our historical society is the collecting and preserving of records, artifacts, memorabilia, materials and genealogical research pertaining to the history of Arcanum and the southern Darke County area. Since the historical society was organized in 2004 much has been accomplished toward this mission. There are more stories to be told, more history to be unveiled, and more memorabilia to share. 150th Anniversary of the American Civil War

Answering the call by President Abraham Lincoln for volunteers to fight for the Union many men of all ages signed up. AWTHS members have shared a little of what they know of their ancestor's service in the Civil War.

John Frederick Rosser - Great Grandfather of Marilyn Rosser Strickler

J. F. Rosser enlisted at Arcanum August 1862 at the age of 41. He served in Co. B, 110th O.V.I. (Ohio Valley Infantry) Rosser earned the rank of 3rd Sergt. He served in Army of the Potomac, was twice captured in Virginia in summer of 1864, and twice escaped (before imprisonment); was wounded at battle of Cedar Creek, October 19, 1864; was taken back to Martinsburg, where he died October 24th and was buried. His remains were later moved to the National Cemetery in Winchester, VA.

GAR Roser Post, No. 379 was chartered September 28, 1883 and named in memory of John F. Rosser.

<u>Harrod Mills</u> - Great-Great Grandfather of Terry Mills

William Henry Mills - Great-Great Grandfather of Terry Mills

Father, Harrod age 43 and son, William Henry Mills age 20 both enlisted on the same day, May 2, 1864 in Greenville and were discharged at Camp Dennison Sept 2, 1864. They served in Co. H, 152nd div. O.V.I. Harrod earned the rank of 2^{nd} Lieutenant, William was a private.

Col. George W. Gunder - Great Uncle of William (Bill) Gunder

At the start of the Civil War, George W. Gunder enlisted in Company B, 71st Regiment, O.V.I., Camp Dave Todd, Troy, Ohio for a service of 3 years. Enlisting at age 21 as a Private, he was mustered in as a Sergeant October 1861, appointed First Sergeant July 1862, commissioned a Second Lieutenant in Company G August 1863 and then promoted to First Lieutenant April 1864. During the summer of 1864 he served as Acting Assistant Adjutant General in the Defenses of the Chattanooga & Nashville Railroad. George resigned on September 28, 1864 and returned to West Baltimore, Montgomery County, OH (Verona).

Living in Marion, Indiana since 1868, George was given authorized in 1885 by Governor of Indiana to organize Company D, 3rd Regiment, Indiana National Guard and was appointed as its Captain. When it was fully recruited in 1890 he became its Colonel. (Gunder was the 10th child of the founder of Arcanum, William Gunder.)

Capt. Daniel Gunder - Great Uncle of William (Bill) Gunder

During the Civil War, at age 18, Daniel enlisted as Private in Company A, 152nd Regiment, O.V.I. on May 2, 1864. This regiment was organized at Camp Dennison, OH to serve 100 days. It was mustered in May 8, 1864 by Robert S. Smith, Captain 2nd Cavalry. U.S.A. and was composed of the 28th Regiment, Ohio National Guard from Darke County, and 2 Companies of the 35th Regiment, Ohio National Guard from Clarke County.

The 152nd left Camp Dennison about the middle of May, 1864 and on its arrival at New Creek, WV went into camp, where it performed guard and picket duty. From New Creek the Regiment marched to Martinsburg and on June 4th started for the front. It reached Beverly, VA on June 27th. During this march the Regiment was twice attacked by the Rebels. After resting a couple of days at Beverly, the Regiment started for Cumberland, Maryland where it arrived on July 2nd. From here detachments were sent to various points. They returned to Cumberland about the last of July, where they remained until the Regiment received orders to return home. On August 25th the 152nd left Cumberland for Camp Dennison. It was mustered out September 2, 1864 on the expiration of its term of service. (*Daniel was the 13 child of William Gunder, founder of Arcanum.*)

John Deis - Great Grandfather of Jim Deis

In 1861 John Deis organized a company of Dayton area men and marched them to Fort Dennison, near Cincinnati. There they enlisted and became Company M, 1st Ohio Volunteer Light Artillery.

John Deis became commander of the company, attained of rank of 1st sergeant and served until December 13, 1864. His military career spanned the battles of Pittsburgh Landing, Shiloh, Corinth, Stone River, Atlanta and Jonesboro

serving under the distinguished generals William Tecumseh Sherman and William S. Rosencrans. John's youngest brother, Philip, also joined the Union Army, but was killed May 15, 1864 in Resaca, GA during General Sherman's "March to the Sea". John organized the Old Guard Post # 23, Grand Army of the Republic.

Jacob Hill - Grandfather of Dave Hill

13th Ohio Veterans Foot, Army of the Cumberland, 4th corps, 3rd Brigade, 3rd Division. (Hill lived in Cincinnati)
Diary entry- September 10, 1865 Sunday

Headquarters 3rd Brigade, 4th Corps. Camp at Green Lake (Texas). This day is my birthday (22 years of age). The fifth one I spent while in the Army, but hope sincerely this will be the last one. Want to spend the others at home. Four years ago we fought our first battle in Virginia, "Carnifax". Well, this day passed off just as the rest did, only had a little work to do. Ration Day (drew three days) issue for 50 men. Quite a job for one man. A pretty hot day.

Poem from diary of Jacob Hill - Author unknown

Comrads, Comrads, I am dying, See the crimson fountain flow. Sick and wounded, I am dying On the field among the foe. But the angels hover around me, They will guard me while I sleep. Comrads, onward to the battle, Do not for the soldier weep. Comrads, Comrads, I am dying, Soon I'll be among the blessed Then, Oh, fare you well forever I am going to my rest. For my mother's arms entwine me

And can no longer stay.
Onward, Comrads, to the battle,
Angels will lead the way.

Josiah Lewis Hill - Great Grandfather of Becky Hill

110th Ohio Voluntary Infantry, Co E, 3rd Div, 6th Army Corps .mustered in Oct. 3, 1862, mustered out June 25, 1865 Diary entry - June 20, 1863 Tuesday (age 29) Evacuation of Harpers Ferry

Our communications are cut off but the Rebs could not take the place it is so well guarded but now we must evacuate and leave all what assurance have we that we shall get through would it not be better to stay and defend the place to the last hoping assistance would come if we go we leave more that \$2000000.00 (as recorded by Josiah Hill) of stores mostly ammunition but this will be destroyed

No tung (tongue) can tell the horrors of this war I have seen mothers walking leading little children through the mud over shoe top deep while the rain was falling as I never saw it fall before others carrying great loads on their backs all that they could bring of what was once a comfortable home. Women and children negroes and soldiers with hundreds of wagons and horses mixed in our confused train I never saw so sad a sight may I never see it again

Oh how anxiously the inquiry goes up from every heart what is Hooker doing? Do they in Washington intend to leave us to the mercies of a cruel foe

I have not heard from home for a long time nor have they heard from me as I know how anxious they must be to hear from their only son the rest having fallen but they are not more so than I to give success to our arms We want a leading spirit. I fear we shall fail. Our leaders appear to care little how it goes. I know our Gen cared less about our defeat that I did.

Grand Army of the Republic - GAR

Grand Army of the Republic GAR was a fraternal organization composed of veterans of the Union Army who served in the American Civil War. GAR was among the first organized advocacy groups in American politics, founded on the principles of "Fraternity, Charity, and Loyalty" on April 6, 1866 in Decatur, IL. Military History of Ohio - Soldiers Edition This book is available for reference at the Garst Museum. It gives all known names of Civil War soldiers from Darke County. GAR Post #23 is not on record at the Museum, other then what appears in this book. Charter members of the Post and Officers of the Post serving in 1883 and 1884 are listed.

<u>The Weary Boys</u> by Thomas E. Pope This book gives an account of the 110th Volunteer Infantry which John F. Rosser and Josiah Lewis Hill served in. Rosser and Hill are quoted many times from their letters, and the story of Rosser's death is told. Copies of some of Rosser's letters were given to the Wright State Archives.

<u>The Calvary Chronicle Volume 5</u>, <u>Issue 1- Newsletter for Calvary Cemetery</u>, <u>Dayton</u>, <u>OH</u> With the help of John Deis, the Old Guard Post No. 23 and the Federal Government, cannon was erected on the soldiers' section of Calvary Cemetery in 1901. As a tribute to Deis, his name was carved on the base of the cannon.
