Our historic 1894 building looks wonderful but there is still some fixing up to do. We are looking into replacing the exterior door on the east side which opens out to the alley and also the kitchen door. The wood floor in the storage room may need to be replaced. And we are looking into using a dehumidifier in the basement to eliminate some of the moisture which is harmful to the building.

I ask for your continued support with our fundraising activities planned in October and December to help cover these improvement projects. As of August 31st, we had \$4,506.88 in checking/savings.

We are almost 80% done with the four volumes of handwritten & typed notes covering every business known to exist in Arcanum from 1852 through 1968. Our team consists of Nancy Baker, who enters the notes into Ms Word and Carol Null, who proofreads every page & makes notes of any corrections required. Those corrections are applied to the original document for archive purposes.

We still have many notebooks to enter into MSWord and could use more volunteers willing to donate time to this entry process. A computer & knowledge of how to create a Word document is the only basic requirements. We can promise you an inside look at many interesting facts about the people and events of Arcanum community. Some of these notes will become a part of our next volume of Arcanum Chronicles.

<u>Ithaca Families</u> is a collection of interesting personal letters which mention Twinsborough, and photos of some of the area's landmarks and local people of the time. The original name of Ithaca was Twinsborough.

<u>Family Histories</u> You are encouraged to write and submit your family history for printing in the newsletter and for preservation in AWTHS archives.

We received excellent coverage about our reference and research features in the "Arcanum News" column this summer written by Vickie Rhodehamel. We also thank her for including news about AWTHS, Civil War displays, Pitsburg and families history. Castine and Ithaca were featured in the Early Bird also. **Pitsburg** submitted by Annette Stewart

Our feature in this newsletter is the "Pitsburg Bicentennial History" written in 1976. It has interesting information about Pitsburg, called Arnettsville in 1900, the name was changed to Pitsburg in 1909. Included is past businesses in Pitsburg such as hotels, restaurants, hardware, blacksmiths, groceries, lumber yard, livestock dealers and so forth. In fact the book quoted it "contains a public school, Lutheran, Methodist, Brethren Churches, a bank, hotel, fire department, grain elevators and lumber yards, besides warehouses, good stores and public conveniences and in the neighborhood of a hundred buildings in all. It is a good shipping point for grain and immense crops of tobacco rained in the surrounding community and does a large mercantile business with the prosperous farmers of this section".

Henry Snyder was the founder of the Union Church, operated the first store, was the first railroad agent and postmaster. The first elevator was built by Abe Arnett and Tom Smith of Arcanum. Ed McCue and Tobias Arnett built the second elevator. The Railroad purchased the right of way in 1881 and began operation as the Indianapolis, Bloomington, Western. The regularly scheduled passenger train made its last run in July, 1950. March 1976 was the last freight train that went through town.

In <u>Monroe Township</u>, Asa Jones and Henry Addington were the first to settle in 1819. Other early settlers were John Mote, Thomas Jones, William and John Richards, Samuel Cams, Peter Shank, Joseph Brown, Peter Abram, and John Snorph.

A school district was laid off in 1836 and another in 1837. There were a total of seven school buildings in the township. Asa Jones taught the first school.

Mote Cemetery was formed on September 5, 1853 from landowner Colin Jones

Franklin Township The first pioneer settlers were Sam Hall and John Haworth who settled here in 1825. Ira Inman in 1826, Dan Oakes, John Hess and Christopher Newcomer in 1828, Jacob Swinger in 1836.

The township was created in 1839. The first School house was built in 1838 or 1839, one fourth mile west of Painters Creek, on the Hiram Rhoades farm. Mary Reed was the pioneer teacher.

Later 12 more one room school houses were built, two miles apart. The first four year high school was built in 1907 on the site of the once Franklin-Monroe Elementary on Hogpath Road. First class to graduate was in 1908. (Names are listed in the book.)

In 1950 the local school districts - Monroe Twp, Franklin, Arcanum and the one and two schools in Twin Twp. and Van Buren Twp. were merged into Southeastern Darke County School District. This merger didn't last long.

<u>Delisle</u> The village of Delisle was named in honor of a resident named Delilah. The Delisle Elevator was once owned by Elmer Drew.

Family Tree - Brumbaugh Family

This is the family line of Annette Sease Stewart, dedicated to my mother, Betty Brumbaugh Sease and Grandpa, Delbert Brumbaugh.

The first Brumbaugh (Brumbach in German) arrived in Philadelphia, PA in 1754 aboard the ship Neptune. From Johannes Henrich Brumbach came **Conrad**, from whom my line continues. His son was **George**; George's son was Samuel, Samuel's son was **Jacob**; next generation was my great grandfather Samuel Irvin Brumbaugh.

For this narrative we begin with Samuel Irvin Brumbaugh, born in 1875 who married Isadore A. Fourman (Dola) born 1897. Samuel lived near Mote Cemetery and later moved to Greenville, Oh. Of their four children, Delbert M, born 1904, was my grandfather.

My Grandfather Delbert married Inez Michael in 1923, and they had one daughter, Betty, who is my mother. Both grandparents are buried in Mote Cemetery. My grandfather Delbert was a farmer in Monroe Township and lived on Karr Road in 1928. This is where I live today with my husband Rex, who continues the farming tradition, and where my children Rachel and Kenneth grew up. Our farm was first purchased by my great grandparents, George and Emma Michael in 1928 and has been in the family since then as a working farm.

My grandparents, Delbert and Inez, were the first generation to farm and live here followed by my parents Dale and Betty Sease, with my brother Fred, sister Shanda and myself.

The second house was built around 1917, the first one being destroyed by fire. My grandfather Delbert died when I was only two years old. The only memory I have of him, besides stories, is - he fixed my doll baby. I have lots of memories of my Grandma Inez, because she would come down to the farm and also I stayed with her during the summer in her house in Arcanum on East George Street.

I liked playing with the other kids down the street, and I remember hearing the cars go down the brick street in the nighttime. Grandma Inez would fix oatmeal every morning and give her cat some for his breakfast. She kept canned pears in her old cupboard in the up ground cellar.

Her favorite use of words were pocket book for purse and machine for her car. I remember her helping me can produce in the summer along with my mother Betty. She brought plants and flowers from her friends' gardens to plant on the Karr Road Farm.

She was quiet but did like to talk, had wisdom, worked hard and knew everyone in Monroe Township and Arcanum and who they were related to. Too bad I wasn't into genealogy back then!

My Grandpa Delbert also worked at Blevins Popcorn Company in Arcanum. My grandparents attended Arcanum EUB Church which is now Faith United Methodist and they cleaned the church.

With that note-through my Grandpa Delbert's side of the family, we descend back ten generations from Rev. Martin Boehm (Beam) who first started the United Brethren Church back in Lancaster County, PA.

I told Kenneth, our son, who is a pastor with Green Tree Church of Brethren in Elizabethtown, PA that he is just returning to his roots as most of our family passed through Lancaster County and other parts of Pennsylvania on their way to our home today-the beautiful state and farms of Ohio, especially Darke County and the Arcanum area.

My mother, Betty, married Dale Sease in 1944. My parents moved off the farm in 1978 to Arcanum and then to the cottages at the Brethren Retirement Center in Greenville last year, 2010. They are still going strong.
