#### 7:00 p.m. Membership Meeting and Program **September 13, 2012 Speaker Bill Gunder: Arcanum's Founding Family**

Bill Gunder is a direct descendant of the founder of Arcanum, William Gunder. His research into William and Nancy Rice Gunder's life took him no further then Arcanum and Lewisburg but researching the 12 Gunder children took Bill and his late wife Carolyn to many parts of the United States. This research resulted in the publication of the book "The Secret Town - The Story of the Founding of Arcanum, Ohio. Bill has written several other books about the history of Arcanum.

Bill acts as the Historical Society's Historian, along with continuously transcribing voluminous notes complied by the late Anita Short on the history of downtown merchants and life in Arcanum.

Bill is an accomplished musician, playing with bands and orchestras throughout the year, he mentors Arcanum band students, and is very involved with the Salem Church of God music library as well.

The accomplishments of the Gunder descendants in music, education and the military are part of the Gunder family history as well as the communities where they made their homes.

Air conditioning Up Date Keith Furlong- 548-6556

On May 3, 2012 the Board approved the installation of air conditioning to the first floor of the building for a cost of \$5,265.68. Davis Refrigeration Inc. installed a 5 ton Bryant high-efficiency condensing unit and a high-efficiency cooling unit which is capable cooling the floor and up to 40 occupants. The installation included changes to the current existing supply air plenum, control wiring, condensate draining, insulated refrigeration lines and electrical disconnect.

The collections expands information found in the Arcanum Chronicles and Arcanum Businesses books published by Bill Gunder and the late Anita Short.

Fred and Carolyn Troutwine spent many hours "clipping" 1913 Arcanum Times newspapers. They had a few good laughs as they clipped social news about the small "burgs" around, advertisements for businesses, and court news. Many thanks for their dedication to this project for our enjoyment.

# The <u>War of 1812</u> exhibit features Jacob Michael, Daniel Sharp and Patrick Shields

**Jacob Michael** served under four different officers from August 1812 through 1814. His pay check was \$8 a month for a total of \$48 for 6 months of service. Jacob's pension record and his wife's widow pension are on display, these copies were obtained from the National Archives. Jacob is Annette Stewart's ancestor.

**Daniel Sharp and Patrick Shields** are ancestors of Brenda Arnett. As part of her display, Brenda has many items compiled in a book for review. <u>Daniel Sharp</u> was married to Elizabeth Albright. He served in Captain Benjamin Powell's Co. from Campbell County, Tenn. This unit served as road builders and wagon guards at Camp Mandeville (near Mobile).

<u>Patrick Shields</u> married Mary Fogle (1) and Salina Boyd (2). Patrick served as a private in Captain Samuel Ashton's Co. with the Ohio Militia, 3<sup>rd</sup> Regiment (Cotgreave's). After the war he lived with General Harrison, and at one time was an express-rider for the General. More info at AWTHS on display and in our library.

<u>WWII</u> Exhibit On display are items belonging to Richard Patterson, father of Carolyn Patterson Furlong. Found among old newspapers given to AWTHS was the County Draft Record which list all the men from Darke County. This is an excellent source of information for those researching WWII troops from our county. county.

If you have WWII items you would like to display or if you would like to make a display about your ancestor who served in the War of 1812, please contact Annette Steward or Carolyn Furlong. Items can be displayed for one Saturday or left on display for the summer. Let us know if your items need to be in locked cases. Also, if we are aware of your collections we would like to put information about the collection in the newspapers.

<u>Schools</u> We have received quite a few nice donations which help with the research of local schools. If you have an old school house on your property we would like to know when the school was built and when classes were last held in the school. We are looking for deeds, photos (old or present), souvenir programs- any items or information that would help create a time line. We are trying to establish a history of the school systems as well as the mergers. Presently we only have a brief history of Franklin Monroe Schools.

We need early class photos from both Franklin and Monroe Schools as well as class photos from Arcanum leading up to 1920 and also from the 1930's & 1940's. Please call me with any information at 692-6462.

**Southeastern School** Franklin Monroe and Arcanum consolidated to form Southeastern School. In 1951 a parcel of land was considered for a new joint high school. This didn't happen - the communities went back to having two separate school systems.

#### PROPOSED SITE FOR SOUTHEASTERN SCHOOL - by Annette Steward

In looking through my grandmother's Bible (Inez Michael Brumbaugh) I came across an article dated November 3, 1951 which appeared in the <u>Journal Herald</u> Newspaper. In talking to my mother about it (Betty Brumbaugh Sease) she said "Oh yes. The people came out to the farm from Dayton to interview my dad".

The article was titled **School Site Promised If Bond Issue Passes.** Delbert Brumbaugh (my grandpa) told the paper that if the bond issue passes he will sell his 30 acre tract of land to them for the erection of the new high school building. The site is located today beside Arcon Builders on Alt. St. Rt. 49 East which borders Gordon-Landis Road on the west, Rt. 49 on the north and Pitsburg-Laura Rd. on the East. Today Rt. 49 runs through the tract of land but at the time it was one field and included land which is now north of Rt. 49 right at the corner of Rt. 49 and Gordon-Landis Road. Dale and Betty Sease own this land today and is farmed by Rex Stewart. The schoolhouse bond was on the November 6<sup>th</sup> ballot.

This article clears up some rumors spread by those against the school stating it would be located in an undesirable site. Charges were made that landlords had threatened tenants with eviction notices if they voted for the schoolhouse. These reports were made public by Virgil Royer, chairman of a citizens committee and by Dr. P. G. Lenhert, President of the Southeastern School board, who called this practice "fear psychology".

It was noted that an Arcanum school official said if the bond was defeated it could mean the end of the vocational agricultural shop program, and, for needed space they might need to partition the gym into classrooms.

# Schools continues

Of the \$880,000 cost, \$770,000 would be for the new high school; \$100,000 for remodeling existing buildings in the district, and \$10,000 would go for the site and improvements.

## **Old Fashioned Days Parade**

The Arcanum Wayne Trail Historical Society took a page from history for the theme of this year's float.

As part of the 1912 Booster Day Celebration Parade, the businessmen constructed a gigantic "Hammer", 16 ft. long and 5 ft. high. The "Hammer" was symbolic of the bad feelings among the merchants and was later burned to end those disagreements. The float, pulled by four black horses, was draped in black, giving a deathlike appearances.

Now, 100 years later, Richard Rinehart pulled our version of the "Hammer" with his restored 1948 Ford 8N tractor.

1912 Booster Day was planned as a homecoming celebrating the completion of the paving of the streets in the business area and to encourage good will between business owners.

Newspapers reported 8,000 people attended the day long activities. Among the attractions were a lady trapeze performer, balloonist, Dare Devil, bands, a ball game and lots of contest for many to compete in, and of course dinner.

#### Education

Bringing History to the Future by Kathy Dohner, Arcanum Third Grade Teacher

During the month of May, Arcanum's Third Grade students were busy learning the history of Arcanum. As part of their classroom study, they each created and illustrated an ABC book about the town of Arcanum. These turned out to be beautiful keepsakes for the students. Here are a few excerpts:

**B** is for brick streets. Old Fashioned Days are held there every year.

F is for founded. The town was founded in 1849. It is now 163 years old!

**U** is for unique name. It is the only place in the world named Arcanum. Its name means "a secret place." **X** is for extraordinary. Arcanum is an extraordinary place to live.

All four classes were also treated to a tour by Fred Troutwine. As he donned his hat (literally) to be their historical tour guide, the children were glad to get to see many of the things we had been talking about in our classrooms. They were amazed at the number of buildings that had changed locations over the years. They really enjoyed getting to see where the railroad went thought town and where the original Gunder cabin had been. Of great importance to them was seeing where the Dreamland Theater had been; the thought of a movie theater in Arcanum was very exciting to them. Many children in my class told me that the tour was even better than recess they were missing--quite a compliment, I assure you. And several even said that it was even more fun than the recent field trip to Ohio Caverns! Wow!

The students were also invited to visit the historical building. Keith and Carolyn Furlong did an exceptional job of showing the children historical objects and letting them know what life was like years ago. They were intrigued by the chamber pot and more than a little grossed out that the children would have the chore of emptying it. One of the boys innocently asked, "Is it empty now?" This comment created quite a bit of laughter.

As part of Ohio's and the nation's new Common Core Standards, third graders will be studying and learning more about our community next year. We are so fortunate to have a community with an interesting history and with wonderful people who are preserving it. The third grade teachers want to thank the Historical Society for maintaining the history of this great community and passing it on to future generations.

Arcanum third grade students and all third grade students across the state study their community as a requirement in their Social Studies class as directed by the Ohio Elementary School Course of Study.

The children are curious as to what Arcanum looked like in the "olden days" and want to know about the people "back then" as they try to understand how Arcanum evolved into the town it is today. What we're able to tell them from available resources, are the people were hard working, innovative, compassionate, and very social.

The late Anita Short's donated collection of The Arcanum Times (1899-1967), has recorded the history of Arcanum and surrounding areas with court and social news, deaths, weddings, businesses, advertising, and, daily newsworthy events. These are documented stories we share with students. The research and writings by the late Anita Short and Bill Gunder, as well as the newsworthy articles in The Arcanum Times, provide documentation of what life *really* was "back then'. We are able to back up generalizations with specific stories and events as we speak with the children. Only then will they be able to take these bits of information, connect them like a puzzle, to develop a deep and lasting respect for those responsible for the foundation of our unique town. Hopefully, we can be instrumental in sharing what we know with this generation and, through example, they will value the importance of passing the legacy on.

We appreciate all our community leaders, of past and present, for making Arcanum the community one of the best to be found anywhere.

There have been requests to purchase these books and also the teachers requested copies so each class room will have a set.

#### It Happened 100 Years Ago

The Fourth Arcanum Chautauqua is to be held July 21-28, with two all day sessions on the two Sundays and an all day session on Farmers Day, also two morning sessions. Lectures by Dr. Frederick S. Cook, the Arctic Explorer, Dr. Frank Dixon, Thomas Brooks Fletcher, and Prof. J. P. Gilbert. Entertainers are to be Ralph Bingham and Charles Taggart, the Strollers Quartet, The Musical Favorites and The Jesse Pugh co. (Arcanum Times 06/06/1912)

The week long event was held each summer from 1909 until 1932 in Ivester Park. It was reported as many as 1000 people attended in 1912. At that time the traction line ran down North Main Street, making it convenient for those coming from other communities (Gordon, Ithaca, Greenville, Jaysville). The D&U Railroad would add special cars and/or a special train if necessary for those wanting to attend the event in that manner. Read more about Arcanum Chautauqua in the book "Arcanum Chronicles".
