The quilt and clothing are on display in the community room along with a brief history of the Rosser family. At the time of Mary's death she was 85 years old living on North St. and was the oldest living person in the community.

New Age Of Preservation: <u>Embark</u> <u>Inspire</u> <u>Engage</u>

That is the theme designated this year by the National Trust For Historic Preservation. Listed are some ways you can "engage" in our community. Let's not forget to involve our youth!

- * Check out AWTHS display at the Arcanum Public Library during May.
- * Attend AWTHS open Saturday May 3, 9 to noon. Stop in and help us celebrate AWTHS's 10th anniversary and also celebrate the history of our building.
- * Visit our Founder's family gravesites in the Ithaca Cemetery. The monuments of William and Nancy Rice Gunder were designated as the first historic site by AWTHS in 2005.
- * If you know of a cemetery that is neglected and needs cleaned up, check with the caretakers or property owners to see if you can help.

What exactly is historic preservation?

It's much more than saving old buildings! Historic preservation champions and protects places that tell the stories of our past.

It enhances our sense of community and brings us closer together: saving the places where we take our children to school, buy our groceries and stop for coffee- preserving the stories of ancient cultures found in landmarks and landscapes we visit - protecting the memories of people, places and events honored in our national monuments.

Historic preservation is also about getting involved in saving these monuments, landscapes and neighborhoods. It doesn't have to be complicated - it can be fun! For example, have your ever...

- * Taken a house museum tour?
- * Shopped in local stores on a Main Street?
- * Volunteered at a historic site or community event?
- * Stopped to appreciate great architecture?
- * Detoured from the highway to follow the historic site markers?

If you have, then you've been part of preservation.

There are many ways you can get involved in historic preservation and save places that matter in your life. The important part is that you recognize the places that are meaningful to you, and to our nation's heritage, and that they deserve to be around for future generations. That's what preservation is all about. Together we are protecting America's heritage for future generations.

Cemeteries and Restoration Information from websites listed below

"We believe that they are sacred and historic sites to preserved. They contain the remains of our earliest settlers - those who came to the "wilderness" that became Ohio - and they are in need of protection for many different reasons." "Old cemeteries are markers of human history. They are links to family we never knew, they are sources of history and they tell us a great deal about ourselves culturally and socially. Sometimes it is the only record we have of an individual - their record of birth and death and sometimes who their parents or spouse were."

"If you have stones (marker) on your property do not remove stones and build or plant a garden over the area. Do not take stones to use in your garden. Once the stone is removed the location is gone and a family may never know where their ancestor was buried."

"If the area and stones cannot be maintained and restored, then check with authorities about the removal of remains to a nearby cemetery as well as the stones."

"Document stones by recording and photography before work begins. Do this before doing any type of clean up, work, or removal's."

Celebrating 10 Years of Accomplishments

Through the dedication and hard work of many people in our area the Arcanum Wayne Trail Historical Society has become a prominent part of Arcanum and southern Darke County.

Founded in 2004 by a group of citizen whose heritage goes back to the early days; Bill Gunder, Dave and JoAnne Pleasant (Smith) Hill, Keith and Carolyn Patterson Furlong, Fred and Carolyn Troutwine and Anita Bowers Short. In the early years trees were so dense squirrels could jump from one tree to another. A time when people walked on plank sidewalks from store to store to avoid the swampy ground. A time when two train tracks intersected in town bringing new people to settle here and to work the fertile ground. The trains then took the products of their hard labor to markets; tobacco, lumber and grains.

Hard work which was ingrained in the early settlers is the same fortitude which inspired AWTHS members to take on the project of bringing life back into the 1894 structure first built to house the Louis Dietrich Hotel and Saloon. Many who volunteered, who labored many hours, those who gave supplies and funds, and those who donated for and worked at the many fundraisers remember the building as the Beck Hotel and later Wayne Trail Grange No. 2647.

A walk through the house is a walk into the past. Woodwork was striped of paint and renewed. Some floors were refinished. Walls stripped of faded wallpaper, then patched and painted. Panels in the meeting room were removed to reveal the 12 foot ceiling with high windows which had been hidden for many years. Window treatments were made from drapes long forgotten by previous owners. Chandeliers and light fixtures which once hung in many older Arcanum homes now shine on hundreds of items members and residents have so generously given to be preserved, items that help tell the history of Arcanum and southern Darke County.

Our talented members worked diligently to craft spindles, woodwork & trim, to build much needed display and storage pieces, and much more. Beautiful stain glass pieces were made to fit in the transoms.

New exterior doors were selected to keep with the period of the house and still meet code requirements. To preserve the exterior, bricks were cleaned, sealed and tuck pointed. Bricks, limestone lintels and sills were replaced where needed. The roof, soffits, gutters, down spouts, furnace and water heater are all new. The 1st floor is now air conditioned. Windows were replaced. And those are only the major projects completed.

The Dietrich Hotel, Beck Hotel and Wayne Trail Grange each hold a place in the history of Arcanum. The Arcanum Wayne Trail Historical Society is bringing that history and the history of southern Darke County together. The mission of AWTHS is: "to collect, preserve and foster an appreciation for our past and promote an interest and knowledge of past historical events for citizens of all ages, which may act as a foundation for future generations and instill a sense of pride in local history."

To accomplish the purpose of AWTHS, "collecting and preserving of records, artifacts, memorabilia, materials, and genealogical research pertaining to the history of the Arcanum area", a reference and genealogy library has been well established. Around 4000 photos of the community, family histories, books, school yearbooks and over 35 binders on all types of subjects in Arcanum as well as Pitsburg, and Southern Darke County are available for research and casual reading. Digital files are also available as well as actual Arcanum Times Newspapers. Books documenting Arcanum's history: the founding and the founders family, businesses, life in the community, the fire department, Ivestor House and Arcanum Public Library are available for purchase.

Several structures have been identified as historical sites. The monuments for the founder of Arcanum, William and Nance Rice Gunder in the Ithaca Cemetery have been restored. These projects also meet the purpose of the society: "the identifying and marking buildings and locations of historical significance as well as the preserving of skills and building techniques shall be considered part of the purpose of the society".

The lot adjacent AWTHS, where the D&U station was located, is now Veterans Memorial Park and is property of the historical society. The park is used for the farmers market and also for community activities.

AWTHS presents educational programs for school children and the public and holds special activities such as Darke County Center of the Arts concerts.

Through membership dues, generous donations, grants and fundraisers AWTHS has generated \$207,670 in the first 10 years, making it possible to remain viable. All who have been part of the AWTHS board these past 10 years appreciate the many, many people who have made this possible.

Did you know the wives of the founders of Ithaca and of Arcanum were sisters? Nancy Rice Gunder and Dicey Rice Colville were from Harrisburg Township, Preble County, Ohio. Their home place was on what now is St. Rt. 503.
