Special Reports

Traction Train Track - Keith Furlong 548-6556

The reconstruction of South Main Street has revealed the rails used by the traction train.

Thanks to the Arcanum Hardware for the use of the employees and equipment we were able to salvage about ten feet of the track. The track was manufactured by Sandusky Steel "81". This probably reflects the year it was manufactured, 1881. This section has been cut into six pieces. If you have an interest in a piece, let me know.

Trivia - Traction Ties Arcanum Times 10-19-1939

Employees of the Bowman Gravel and Sand Company of Troy have been busy the last several days tearing up the old traction ties on State Route No. 49 from the north corporation of the village to North Street. A strip of hot mix was place in the center of the street for this distance. The rails from North Street to the corporation edge had been removed some time ago but the ties had not been taken out and they were causing trouble on that particular strip of highway. Many local residents hoped that the highway department would continue the improvement of removing both the ties and rails from North Street to the corner of South and Main Streets where State Route 49 makes a turn to Dayton, but employees of that company stated that the improvement in the village is a responsibility of the town.

Serve Arcanum - Arcanum High School Students Community Service Day

May 9th a group of students volunteered at the historical society-washing the insides of the 1st floor windows, putting a fresh coat of paint on the fence, and mulching the garden. They were treated to Brumbaugh's apple fritters for helping to complete these spring projects.

Coffee and Conversation with JoAnne Hill

The first of a series of gatherings at AWTHS was held June 7th with JoAnne Hill leading the conversation. JoAnne started the trip down memory lane with a brief history of The John Smith Company, the family store where she learned to walk, developed good work ethics at a very young age and made many long lasting friendships.

JoAnne told us about her learning to make change while sitting on her mother's lap. The electric cash system carried money from the sales person to the second floor office where JoAnne's mother, Mildred Pleasant, would then send the correct change down to the sales person. As a little girl of around 5 yrs old JoAnne not only learned to make change she also was encouraged to start a coin collection.

There was always a job for little JoAnne. She remembers sorting through potatoes and onions to separate the rotten produce.

JoAnne recalled as a little girl going with Dr. Hawes on his house calls, waiting in the car then enjoying the ride back to town through the country side. Everyday Mrs. Hawes baked a pie. JoAnne learned to drink with Dr. Hawes, having a little piece of pie and a small cup of coffee with them.

The D&U Railroad was the first through Arcanum. The conductor had a key to the big wooden bread box that sat outside the front of the store. When they came through early in the mornings they would stop, unlock the box and deliver fresh bread from the Miami Baking Co. then be on their way.

Many guests shared stories:

- When going to school in Pitsburg a field trip was riding the train to Arcanum.
- Standing near the tract so the grandkids could see the train go by and the engineer stopped the train, asking the little people if they would like to ride the last couple block into the station.
- A nickname for the D.G&U Railroad "Dirty Green Underwear"
- When there was no community swimming pool some kids rode their bikes to Wayne Lakes. One girl rode her pony.
- The bus that ran from Dayton to Greenville would often pick up the regular riders at their house along the route and drop them off at their door on the return trip. That way they didn't have to go to the bus stop.
- If one school bus driver couldn't drive that day he would have a 14 yr of student drive the bus to pick up the kids.
- Another bus driver would take the kids to school in his own car if the winter weather was too bad for the bus to get around. It would take him 3 or 4 trips to get all the kids to school.
- Remembering the movies and concerts in Ivester Park.
- Lester Meyer moved to Arcanum because he saw the well kept farms in the area and thought this would be a good place to set up his blacksmith business.
- Many stories were shared about Ruth Starr, a strict but very good teacher.

2014 Old Fashioned Days Parade

Riding on the AWTHS float this year were current Arcanum residents representing four generations of direct descendants of William Gunder, the Founder of Arcanum. Great Grandson and local historian William "Bill" Gunder rode with his daughter Tamala Gunder Marley and her husband Jeffrey. Lucas Marley and Nathan Marley, with his wife Brittney, represented the 3rd great generation. Also riding on the float were great-great-great-great-grandchildren Carolyn "Ellie" and Miles Marley. It is great to have four generations of our founder's family still living in Arcanum.

Richard Rinehart once again pulled the float with his 1948 Ford 8N tractor. Richard's restored tractor always gets a lot of attention.

Memories - 1935 Medicine Show

In the summer of 1935 a most wonderful event that this six year old had ever seen came to Arcanum.

The town's people were buzzing with excitement about a big tent being raised to hold a medicine show, which was coming for a whole week. Every night I went with my dad, mom and brother to enjoy all the activities.

Between the acts of clowns and entertainment, a man would walk back and forth among the crowd talking about and selling his medicines and liniments, which he said would cure aches and pains. (This being about 80 years later, I could use some of those now.)

Before the show began, each evening, there was a lot of chatter and visiting going on. This is when I met a little curly haired, freckle faced girl. Her name was Delores Christman and she lived with her family in half a double house east of Troutwine's Garage. (I think her Dad worked at Troutwine's.)

Delores and I were delighted when we discovered we both would be starting in the first grade soon as September arrived. We had heard Miss Fenton was a "nice teacher".

Another fond memory of the Medicine Show is a man going around waving boxes of "milk duds" in the air. That was the first time I had those little delicious chocolate and caramel candies.

We can still buy milk duds. I was in Walgreens the other day, and after so many years have gone by, I thought I would try some again. I really was not surprised to find them not as "tasty" as the ones I ate at the Medicine Show when I was six.
