It has been a very busy and productive year. We started the New Year with our carry-in-dinner and election of officers in January. March 9th 7:00 P.M Program: Layers of History

Hannah Wiest, Darke County Parks Naturalist, will be the guest of AWTHS March 9th to present her program "Layers of History: Women's Fashion During the War Between the States".

Hannah's lecture presents a *revealing* history about ladies' fashion and undergarments during the early 1860s. She will expose each layer and the purpose of the individual garments and explain how the fabric content, print, dress style, and cut all disclosed a woman's class, age, and social standing.

Wiest will be dressed in a complete ensemble and have many other garments to show as well as a Power Point. She is a member of The Ohio Valley Civil War Association which is made up of the 35th Ohio Volunteer Infantry, the 19th US Regular Infantry, the 1st Ohio Battery C Light Artillery, Birge's Western Sharpshooter (the best US Signal Corp unit in the country), and the Civil War Civilians. Wiest is a Darke County native, graduated from WSU in creative writing, and currently works as a naturalist educator at DCP. She has a passion for history and spends her free time researching, pattern drafting, and sewing historical clothing both for her living history hobby and for the Park District. She and her new husband, Robert, live in the Arcanum area.

NEW COLLECTIONS REFERENCE LIBRARY

The Fasick family donated their family scrapbook which contains numerous newspaper articles and programs from area families and events. The time era is from 1930-1950's. Areas include: Potsdam, Phillipsburg, Laura, Ludlow Falls, West Milton and local news on many families including Mehaffie, Fasick, Ditmer, and Hissong families.

There are considerable notes about the early pastors of local churches of Potsdam. Pitsburg, and Miami County as well as the obits of Rev. Enos Pemberton in 1924 and Eld. Jno. Calvin. Those with Brethren history roots or church history, those interested in notes about WWII and the old schools of Potsdam and Union Twp. will benefit from this scrapbook. There are lots of articles and clippings of obits, anniversaries, weddings, and birth announcements.

Come and look through the book on Open First Saturday's or by appointment. It is certainly interesting reading!

Bill Gunder's Research Notes (possibly from Anita Short) are in the library. There are multiple binders but I'm including notes from one of them. I encourage you to come in, sit down and look through them. Some of these are digital also. However, we have hard copies for those not wanting to use the lap top to search for them.

The first binder is old obits and notes from Arcanum area. These are probably taken from the old Arcanum newspapers. I do not know if this information is separate from Rose Shilts' obits collection, which is digitalized and can be found on the AWTHS web site. This information dates from 1899-1935.

On page 16 in binder we read from <u>Arcanum Times</u>: (note as is in notebook) *M.E. History-Rise of Gordon* Congregation from log cabin. Organized ca 1830 at the Ashley home near the Preble Co. line. After a few years at home of Edmund C. Thomas until ca 1840. The log church was built about ½ mile SW of Gordon. Congregation (sat) on slabs with 4 pins for legs and no backs, light by tallow candle. Later church changed at Gordon as Union Church. (Dec 12, 1901).

**Just a note on church history. Nancy Baker typed some church notes on different Arcanum churches: Evangelical United Brethren, Pilgrim Holiness (former Reformed Church), Immanuel Baptist and Methodist Episcopal. If you have early church history of any town or township church, such as anniversary celebration books, which gives the church's history, we would like a copy. Or we would like an opportunity to review the items and return them to you. Southern Darke County church history is one of the projects Bill started.

Second binder is clippings on small "bergs" around from the <u>Arcanum Times</u> newspaper dated 1913: Small bergs include Nineveh, Ithaca, Beech Grove, Verona, West Sonora, Mosshill (Potsdam??), Grand View, Number Nine, 4 Twp. Corner, Germany, Gordon, Steel Point, 3 Miles North, Pitsburg, Southview are listed, possibly others. Another good find and you might even find your relative's name listed.

Questions I do have questions when trying to sort out where some of these communities are and I need your help. I think Mosshill is Potsdam. Family names listed here are: Shank, Ditmer, and Miller to name a few. Could 4 Twp. Corner possibly be Fourman's Corner near the Tarbucket School area? Daniel Fourman, Hofacker, and Oda families are mentioned. Would Germany be around the "S" curve on Grubbs-Rex Road in Monroe Township, as a school called Germany is known to be here? Grand view? South View? Anyone with information please contact me.

Gordon Info Needed

I'm collecting information on Gordon and have some notes so far from various sources. Anyone who would like to research or gather data please notify me. We have some sources in our library and digital files but need volunteers to search, gather the notes together, and possibly type. If you can't do the computer or type you can still look at actual reference materials so don't let this hinder your search.

We're on Facebook now!

For those of you into social media check us out. "Like" our page and share. As of November 22, less than a week after completing, we have 99 FB members for our page. We are still maintaining our web site which gives more detailed info. The FB page allows us to share our current events easily and share publicity releases. Portraits of Lewis and Elizabeth Dietrich - Annette Stewart

The AWTHS presently has two large portraits that were given on loan by the Don Dietrich family of their ancestor Lewis Dietrich. Lewis was the owner and had the brick home built in 1894 which was the Louis Deitrich Saloon. Per Anita Short's Arcanum Business book we note the following: Per the GJ 4/5/1894 we read "The old Peter Siler property was sold last week to a Mr. Deitrich of New Bremen, who proposed to erect a hotel theron." "The Deitrich house is now completed and will soon be occupied." GJ 9/27/1894. In six months' time the house was completed and was the Deitrich Saloon until 6/29/1899.

Today it is the home of the Arcanum Wayne Trail Historical Society located at 123 W. George Street in Arcanum.

From his obit found in The Arcanum Times dated 2-2-1939 we read that Lewis was born July 29, 1845 and was born to John and Elizabeth Dietrich. His birthplace was Mechlenburg, Germany. In 1850 his parents and six siblings came to Ohio and located in the New Bremen area. Until 1880 he worked for the government agencies in building canals in western Ohio. In 1880 he married Christina Roh at Piqua, Ohio. To this union were born nine children: Nero Henry, Caroline, Charles, Otto, Alma, Walter, Julius, Luella and Oliver. He moved to Arcanum in 1893. In 1913 he retired from farming and moved to Pitsburg. In an interview with family of Don Dietrich, we learn he had a house near the old Pitsburg School which was located on the north end of Pitsburg near the Jefferson Street and Pitsburg-Laura Road intersection. His farm was found on the 1910 plat map and was on Grubbs-Rex Road in Monroe Township and was around 126 acres. Some of that farm is owned and farmed by Rex and Annette Stewart presently. It was also the farm that the Germany one room school house stood on. On the map it shows three house's on the tract of land and is located before the S curve on Grubbs-Rex. He died January 20, 1939 at 93 years of age. He is buried at Mote Cemetery along with other Dietrich's including his son Otto and grandson Glen. Other children of Otto are: Lloyd, Ruth, and Carl. Glen's son, Don is how we acquired the two large portraits of Lewis and Elizabeth. Glen's children are: Ron "Pete", Don, and Ellen. There is also different spellings of Lewis first and last name as well as his wife's in researching the history of the AWTHS house as well as his obit and tombstone. According to Don Dietrich, each family decided on the spelling of their last name. The AWTHS has two Souvenir school programs for Germany School. The first is the year 1903. A number of Lewis's children attended and their names are listed as (note spelling) as following: Oliver Diedrich, Elma, Walter, Julius, and Luella. The teacher was Oscar Stuhlman. In 1908 attending from the Dietrich family were: Luella and Oliver Diedrich. Teacher is listed as Alfred Oakes.

My parent's memory of the Dietrich farm, which was east of their farm, was that the Dietrich sisters, Alma and Luella, were single and lived there. My parents raised tobacco and when they were stripping it in the winter my siblings, Fred and Shanda, became tired of waiting around. Fred said to Shanda "let's go home". So they walked through the fields and over fence rows to get back home. Trouble was it was very muddy and their little boots squished down in the mud and then Shanda lost her boots! By that time everyone back at the farm wondered where the children were. But they had finally arrived home safe and sound!
