Presenter: Roane Smothers, Descendent of James and Sophia Clemens

Join us when Roane Smother tell the history of Longtown. James Clemens, a freed slave who came from Virginia in 1818, became a prosperous farmer. Many former slaves migrated to the vicinity and Longtown was formed.

Longtown, located at 467 Stingley Road, one mile from the Indiana line, was a community far ahead of its time, a bold experiment of integration. The tri-racial settlement included the Union Literary Institute where trades were taught which helped the community to be self-sufficient. Hear how it became a center for the Underground Railroad.

Join us Sept. 12 at 7:00 to learn more about James Clemens, a significant individual in the history of Darke Co.

A joint effort with Twin Township Trustees is a hands-on workshop to be offered to the public on cemetery stone cleaning, setting, and preservation. It is scheduled for July 20 from 9-5am at Ithaca Cemetery. Rain date is July 27. # **DULL FAMILY**

In preparing for the Historic Walking Tour and Baker Project I came across the Dull's.

Welcome Jefferson, or WJ, Dull was quite a busy man involved in many businesses. He was born to John and Delilah (Baker) Dull and married Mary Elizabeth Fourman in 1874.

He worked for his uncle Josiah Baker digging ditches and later his own business of building streets. With Charles Williams, they operated four tobacco warehouses. One being at 120 S. Main where Trojan Pizza was located in 1967-69. One of the gas wells was also located here.

WJ Dull was also President of the Farmers National Bank which was located at 20-24 W. George and is on the tour. When not working on his farms or in town, WJ was near Rockledge, FL overseeing his orange grove. He also purchased the building where Tom Wetzel's "The Olde Nostalgia Shoppe" is today. Interesting is his home was located at 113 E. South and Albright here in Arcanum. His son, Samuel lived on Tom Jackson's farm in Twin Township where the old Center School Houses lies. The farm was called "Fair View". It can be seen on the 1910 plat map of Twin Township.

One of WJ and Mary's farm was in Franklin Twp on Delisle Fourman Road. Sources of this info came from the Dull file at Greenville Public Library Genealogy Dept. We have the articles in AWTHS research file on their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary; <u>History of Darke County, OH</u> by Wilson, 1914; obit from Arcanum Times 1935 on Mrs. Mary Dull; and various Bible records and marriage certificates. The clippings and info will also be on display later this summer and fall in the house.

# IF YOU MUST CHANGE YOUR SCHEDULE TIME, PLEASE CONTACT ANOTHER VOLUNTEER ON THE SCHEDULE TO SWITCH TIMES. PLEASE CONTACT BEV RENCH 623-0468 OF ANY SCHEDULE CHANGES.

NOTE: On Veterans Day, veterans with proper ID along with his/her immediate family members enter free (defined as those living in household, but essentially spouse and children). If veteran is deceased, spouse with proper papers would also be admitted. Active military in uniform or proper ID are free any day.

Also be aware that solicitation of signatures or demonstrations for specific causes within 1000 feet of fair property is prohibited. PETA and the US Humane Society representatives are usually identifiable by ID tags around their neck and clipboards. If you notice anyone that might be connected to these organizations soliciting signatures, simply notify the deputy sheriff and he should deal with it.

# Fair Gate Notes continue

# Important Notes For All Shifts:

- 1. All people 12 yrs. and older pay adult fee for a day ticket.
- Tear off a ticket from the roll, per person and drop into the bucket.
- 2. All weekly passes are \$20. Be sure the passes are filled out and signed.
- 3. All vehicles must have a parking pass and each person, 12 yrs. and older must have a day or week pass.
- 4. Money boxes will be changed out at 2 pm. Additional money pick-ups for the first few days will be at 5 pm and 7 pm.

# 7 am – 12 noon Shift

- Arrive at 6:45 am to pick up the money box. Enter the fair office backdoor under the grandstand (knock, they will let you in).
- Set up table at gate.
- Put out appropriate sign for the day, if any. (Seniors Day, Veterans Day, refer to NOTE below.)

# 12 noon – 5 pm Shift

- At 2 pm, one person should go to the fair office to pick-up a **NEW** money box for the rest of the day. Enter the fair office backdoor under the grandstand.
- Go to the Sheriff's building next to the grandstand to get an escort back to the gate. Return with the deputy and the **OLD** money box. Be sure to place ticket roll and passbooks in the old box because you will get new ones. It would be helpful if the person that remains at the gate, has an approximate money count.

# 5 pm – 10 pm Shift

- Start counting money at 9:30 pm
- Deputy will take you to the fair office between 9:45 pm and 10 pm. Take money box and gate book with you.
- Close tent flaps and turn off lights. Leave gate open.

# Celebrating 100 Years \* Women's Right to Vote

1919 The federal woman suffrage amendment, originally written by Susan B. Anthony and introduced in Congress in 1878, is passed by the House of Representatives and the Senate. It is then sent to the states for ratification. August 26 1920 The 19th Amendment to the Constitution, granting women the right to vote, is signed into law.

Finally, on August 26, 1920, the <u>19th Amendment</u> to the Constitution was ratified. And on November 2 of that year, more than 8 million women across the United States voted in elections for the first time. <u>https://www.history.com/topics/womens-history/the-fight-for-womens-suffrage</u>

# ARCANUM WOMEN GET TO VOTE TOO!

"Women Voters Take Honors at Election. In Precinct B. Mrs. Harry Kester cast the first vote at 5:45 a.m. In both Precincts A & B the last votes were by women--in B, Mrs. D.E. Etzler cast the last ballot and in A, Mrs. John Koehler cast the last vote.

There was some doubt about the number of votes that would be cast by women but at the election Tuesday (November 2) it was clearly demonstrated that they are just as interested in the results as the men, the normal vote of the town being practically doubled. Another surprise to the men voters, was the intelligent way in which the women went about voting."
