Farming and Getting Crops to Market Early 1800's From History of Darke County 1880 By W. H. Beers

<u>Page 271:</u> "Darke County was first settled by an industrious, hardy race of pioneers poor men who had been renters in other parts of the state. As soon as they were able to raise \$100 or upward, they came here and invested it in land in order that they might have a home of their own and not be compelled to work one-third of their time for an exacting landlord. As about all the means of the settlers were out in land and as there was a heavy growth of timber all over the county to be cleared away before there could be anything raise to live upon."

To procure breadstuff milling had to be done many miles from home. A single trip occupied from two to five days. Salt and leather must be had once a year by a journey to Cincinnati which required from seven to ten days. If as was sometimes the case, some products were in excess of the family need and it was desired to sell, there was no market nearer than Piqua or Dayton and the roads were so intolerably bad that it required a good span of horses in the most favorable season of the year to haul twenty give bushels of wheat.

<u>Page 272:</u> Under the impulse of making, having living at and enjoying a home the people in their poverty labored diligently, lived frugally and contentedly cleared up their farms, minded their own business, helped their neighbors and were accorded the favor and blessing of their God.

Money payment was out of the question and the settlers (teacher in this case) needs were great. He said I was poor and scares of money and my clothing was not the kind suitable for winter. I went to the grist mill five miles away for corn meal at night after school." *The story goes on to tell of the teacher needing clothes. He had no money. At the store the owner told him he didn't want his services as a teacher in trade for the clothes or the corn, potatoes or produce. But would take whiskey. So the teacher went to the distillery between Greenville and Mina and sold the mill the teachers corn in exchange for whiskey. The corn was lower than the market but the whiskey higher value and used that to settle the store account for the clothes.

The Arcanum Telephone Exchange will be converted to Automatic Dial operation next Tuesday, December 3, it was announced today by H. F. Clapper, Greenville District Manager for Ohio Telephone Services Company.

In order to take full advantage of the daylight hours, the conversion is scheduled to begin at 7:30 in the morning. According to Mr. Clapper, all "city" telephones will be converted simultaneously from the new central office, and "city" subscribers will know that their dial service is in operation when they can lift their telephone receivers and hear the dial tone. In the rural area, however, party lines must be converted one at a time, but extra installation crews in the Arcanum area on Tuesday are expected to complete the rural conversion before sundown. Arcanum Preservation Society Up Date Submitted by Angela Herron

The *Arcanum Preservation Society* restoration crews are hard at work. The auditorium crew continues working on removing the false ceiling in the Opera House auditorium. The two man crew carefully planned out the removal which required extensive bracing to prevent catastrophic damage to the structure of the building and has now successfully removed all but one of the large beams. The window crew took a well-deserved break but is now back to work. The restoration of the Mayor's office has been delayed until the beam removal upstairs is complete.

The *Heritage Committee* has been working on putting together a comprehensive history of the building and recently found a photo from 1912 that we look forward to revealing on social media soon. The *Finance Committee* has been working with our grant writer to identify grant opportunities. The *Communications, Events & Social Presence Committee* continues to work on the 2023 event schedule while also concentrating on social presence. They reached out to our local State Representative, US Representative and Ohio Senator, inviting them to tour the building. These efforts were rewarded when Senator Stephen A. Huffman toured the building on March 13th. Representative Warren Davidson's office did reply but as of yet has not been available to tour.

Giddy Up Move Along

Written by JoKay Miltenberger - Included in the book Arcanum Sesquicentennial 1999.

What do local people who love their horses and enjoy working with them on beautiful spring weekends do? According Ron Kauffman, who with his wife Teresa, fits this category – they make plans. Along with about five other families, the Kauffmans, Jim Mills, Lloyd Stryker, Bob Beisner, Bob Baker, Dwaine Minnich and Myron Emrick decided to pack up their vittles, get the wives and kids and form a wagon train.

During 1991 the wagon train became a reality. One bright Saturday morning 11 wagons met at the Bill Young farm, and with Dwaine Minnich as wagon master, made their way to Hency's farm in Preble County. There they took care of the horses, built fires and arranged the wagons much as the pioneers had.

Kauffman says in 1992 the wagon train had grown to 52 outriders, 70 horses and 11 wagons or carts being pulled. What do you do when evening comes? Just like they did in the "old days", Kauffman said. "We sit around and talk, trade stories and pictures and just relaxed".

The local couples have enjoyed the wagon train trip to Preble County or another site each year since.

2023 AWTHS' follow up to JoKay's article. When ask about the Wagon Train Dwaine Minnich remembers that at one time there were 17 wagons. Dwaine was Wagon Master for 11 years; the group stayed together a few years after that. At times hog roasts and entertainment was planned. Dwaine expressed appreciation of the Sheriff Dept. and State High Patrol for always assisting when the Wagon Train crossed state routes.

Farming in 1957 Tomato Tour Scheduled Friday

Darke County tomato growers and canners will visit six farmers in this area Friday, July 19, when they take their annual tour to observe the conditions of the plants and to assist with production problems.

Assisting in the day's discussion program will be E.C. Wittmeyer, extension vegetable specialist, and Dr. Lyle Coleman, extension plant pathologist, Ohio State University.

The tour will begin at 9 a.m. when the group will assemble at the Union Foods Products company, Front St., Greenville. The first stop will be at H. D. Rhoades farm on R.R. 2, Arcanum, where direct seeding in 42 and 30 inch rows will be observed. After a visit to the Aaron Brumbaugh farm, R.R 2 Arcanum, the group will tour the Hobart Manufacturing Company, East Third Street, Greenville.

In the afternoon, tourist will meet at the Ansonia school at 12:46 p.m. to visit the following farms: Donald Swank, R.R. 1 Rossburg; Henry Stucke, R.R. 1, Maria Stein; Herbert Bergman, R.R. 1 Maria Stein, where Urbana and Rutger tomatoes are grown, and at the Bud Dull farm R.R. 1, Maria Stein, where five fertilizer demonstration plots will be viewed.

Darke county growers, canners and the agricultural extension service are sponsoring the tour, which is open to the public.
